THE STRATFORD DISASTER.

The recent trolley car accident at the upper part of Stratford, Connecticut, by which twenty-nine people lost their lives and sixteen were injured, is without doubt one of the worst horrors in the history of electric railroads. Many definitions of the cause of the accident have been advanced, but the facts that have been brought out during the inquest, leave but little doubt as to the causes which precipitated the disaster. It will be remembered that the accident occurred during the second week of the present month, on the extension of the Bridgeport and Stratford Electric Railway through the northern part of Stratford to Shelton, ten miles north, and known as the Shelton Street Railway.

The road was entirely new, having been opened for traffic only three days before the accident occurred, and the approach to the bridge appears to have been in a unfinished condition. This approach for the whole 600 or 700 feet of its length consisted of sand and gravel fill, upon which the ties had been laid, but it seems that the tamping or surfacing had not been properly attended to.

There has been a great lesson stated. It is simply a little less than criminal to allow suburban trolleys to run upon newly laid tracks, before the work of ballasting has been properly completed. Fortunately in the Province of Prince Edward Island accidents as fatal as the one at Stratford do not happen. Canada, however, shares to some extent in the terrible list of fatalities transpiring daily. The recent accident at Polygarpe, although not so large, was one of the saddest on record and by which an entire family met an untimely end. The record of railroad accidents have almost become a daily occurrence and should call for greater care on the part of the employer in the providing of a proper service and careful staff of employees.

The Scientific American in speaking of the recent automobile exhibition at Paris says: "The recent exhibition more than paid expenses, and there is a tidy little balance left to facilitate international contests. The exhibition showed that what was desired by a large number of people was an automobile carriage which should be bigger than a tricycle and which could be sold at a price much less than the large and heavy automobile vehicles. Those which cost about \$800 are very popular."

The law of the land has been dealing with the faith healer in a rather decisive manner of late. Recently a Chicago judge imposed a fine of \$100 and costs on a faith curist on conviction of violating the medical practice and in administering to Mrs. Annetta Flanders, who died under the faith-healing treatment. The Dowie treatment comprises the laying on of hands. The court held that under the law these healers must resort only to spiritual and mental means of treating the sick. When material means are added the state law governing the practice of medicine is violated. To the faith healer even the ordinary means to assist nature are denied hereafter, because the court held that all that a physician or surgeon did was to assist nature. This is certainly an original and interesting decision.

In commenting upon the reports from South Africa that the Boers in case of war will murder all the Englishmen or commit other unmentionable atrocities the Montreal Witness says: "The reports from South America, are, we make bold to say, malicious rubbish, based at the most on taverro babble. There is a war party forever circulating stories calculated to arouse the passions of Englishmen and increase the feeling of hostility which wiser heads would seek to allay. The Boers, though ill informed, are a well behaved, religious people. To credit them with a threat such as that mentioned by the Johannesburg correspondent of the London Morning Post is to rank them among the most ruthless savages, for whom extermination would not be an undeserved punishment."

THE PHILIPPINE FORCE.

Ten Additional Regiments will be sent to Fight the Filipinos. The Army will Then Number Practically 65,000 Men.

WASHINGTON, D. C. August 21.—An order has been issued directing that ten additional regiments of infantry volunteers be organized for service in the Philippines. The regiments will be numbered from 38 to 47. They will be organized at the following places in the order named: Fort Snelling, Minn.; Fort Crook, Neb.; Fort Riley, Kan.; Camp Meade, Pa.; Fort Niagara, N. Y.; Fort Ethan Allan, Vermont; Fort Leavenworth, Kansas; Jefferson Barracks, Mo.; and South Framingham, Mass. The organization of these regiments will give Gen. Otis a force of 62,451 men and in addition to this it is proposed to increase the hospital corps in the Philippines to 5,000 and to increase the number of medical officers, so that General Otis will have an army of practically 65,000 men. The enlistment of the ten additional regiments will make the total volunteer force in service 30,507 men, leaving but 4493 men of the 35,000 authorized and called for, and the total strength of the army about 95,000 men. It appears from these orders that the new regiments are to be mainly recruited in New England, middle and central western States. It is said that no special effort is to be made to secure recruits for in the Southern States. This is due, it is said, to the experience of the officers who operated in that quarter for recruits for the ten volunteer regiments just organized. The only places where difficulty was experienced in securing men was in Georgia, Alabama and the Carolinas, and the Gulf States and the two north-western Pacific States. "The policy of the War Department," said Secretary Root, "is to furnish General Otis with all the troops and supplies that he can use which are necessary to wind up the insurrection in the shortest possible time." The Secretary said that no delay would be allowed in enlisting, equipping and supplying the new regiments nor in transporting them as well as the other regiments already organized for the Philippines, as soon as they were needed for active action.

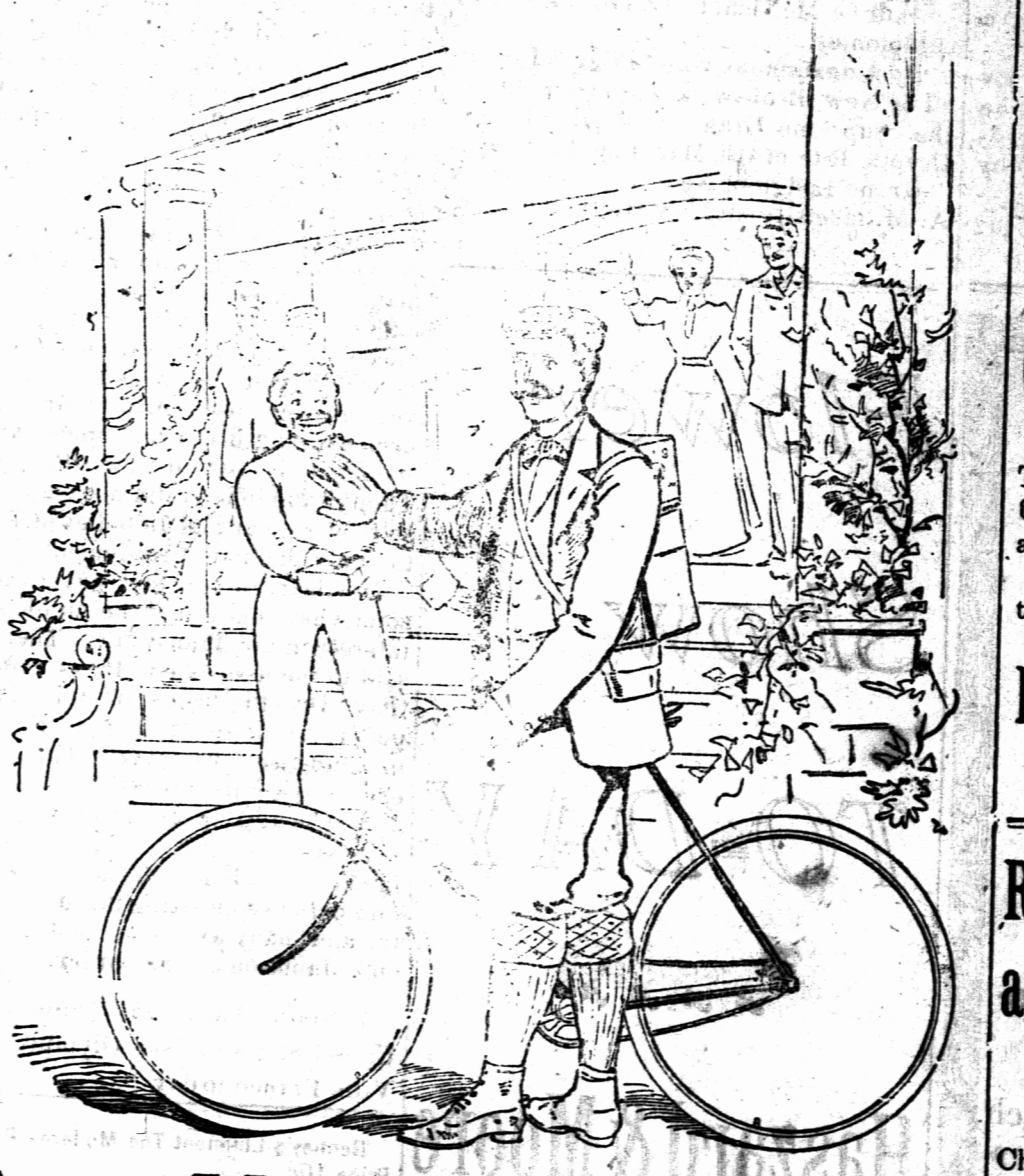
