DISCUSSING ISLAND OUTLAY.

On August 3rd there was some discussion in the House of Commons on various votes for Prince Edward Island. On the vote of \$100,000 for the line from Cardigan to Montague Bridge in reply to Mr. Hackett Hon. Mr. Emmerson stated that the distance is 6 1/2 miles and that a survey has been made. In regard to the vote of \$10,000 for improvements at Summerside Mr. Lefurgey wanted to know whether this was for a new station? Mr. Emmerson replied that he could not tell what use would be made of the money, but would visit Summerside and inquire into the conditions. Mr. Lefurgey pressed the need of a new station and also insisted on the right of the House to know for what purpose they were voting the \$10,000.

Mr. Lefurgey also asked for an explanation of the \$5,000 asked to extend the track along the harbor front at Charlottetown, pointing out that the sum was altogether insufficient. To this Mr. Emmerson replied, "It will extend the track to the Charlottetown Wharf (the Plant Line Wharf) that would be pretty nearly as far as the site of the new station house." This would seem to imply an intention to place the new station between George and Prince Streets.

The discussion on other items of railway expenditure took a pretty wide range. Hon. Mr. Haggart especially objecting to the large expenditure on the Intercolonial Railway, on which with the Island Railway he said the capital outlay since 1896 had been \$24,000,000. This he charged wholly to account of the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Lefurgey corrected Mr. Haggart and asserted that the

Intercolonial was operated largely for the benefit of Ontario manufacturers, who got rates for 500 miles on the Government road of nearly 50 per cent less, and 80 per cent less for 1000 miles than the Grand Trunk or Canadian Pacific charged for like distances.

Mr. Haggart contended that there should be no more expenditure on the Intercolonial charged to capital account. In reply to this Mr. Hughes pointed out that the railway expenditures in P. E. Island were for new work, and yet Mr. Haggart had objected to it. Hon. Mr. Fielding also brought up the large expenditure on the canals and contended that while the Maritime Provinces might now be getting what was fairly due them they were getting no more than their share.

We must decline to recognize The Patriot as an authority on the great blueberry question, or on geography. Skowhegan is in the State of Maine, not in New Brunswick.

The esteemed Patriot falls into the verbal error of saying, "Parliament will prorogue." Parliament has no power to prorogue itself. It may be prorogued by the Governor General.

The death is announced of Senator Aikins of Toronto. He was born in 1823 and first called to the Senate in 1867. He was Secretary of State in Sir John Macdonald's Government, afterwards Governor of Manitoba 1882-8 and was reappointed to the Senate in 1896.

"Citizen" in yesterday's Guardian was in error in thinking "there are more than 100 lights," if he referred to arc lights on the streets. The city pays for 75 arc lights at \$60.50 each, and for 22 incandescents on the streets at \$18 each. It also pays for 63 lights in the city building. The total amount of these contracts does not exceed \$5,800 yearly.

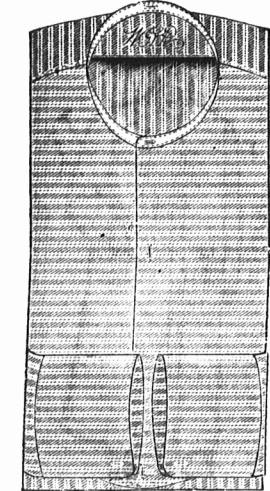
