THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

On 8th November, now very near at hand, the great Presidential election in the United States will take place. The recent election in Newfoundland and the Dominion show that this is so far a good year for Governments, and probably three out of four persons in Canada who have given a thought to the question have counted upon a Republican victory and the re-election of President Roosevelt. We are still of that opinion, but there seems of late some little revival of Democratic confidence based upon the possibility of their candidate Judge Parker carrying the great states of New York. This the New York Herald and the New York Times appear to think is probable. The New York Times at the conclusion of a lengthened review of prospects in the Empire State sums up the situation as follows. We quote:

"The campaign managers of Mr. Roosevelt and Republicans generally have appeared to believe, and they have succeeded in creating the impression, that Judge Parker will receive the Electoral votes only of the Solid South and one or at most two of the Northern States. They have 'calculated' Mr. Roosevelt's election as not only sure but as overwhelming. The one thing sure about this campaign is that nobody knows who is going to be elected. It is not at all certain that the voters of the country are going to elect Mr. Roosevelt. While surface indications and the guesses, conjectures, and the sympathies of men may point to a Republican victory there may be forces at work deeper which will bring about a totally different result. In 1880 Lord Beaconsfield appealed to the country in a general election of members of the House of Commons with entire confidence that his Government would be sustained and a large Conservative majority returned. He wrote to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland toward the close of the canvass a memorable letter full of the spirit of cocksureness and declaring that 'men of light and leading' were altogether with the Conservatives. Yet when the voting was over Gladstone had 106 majority in the House of Commons. The British public was astounded. It had foreseen no such result, it had not believed it to be possible. Nobody can say that there will be, but nobody can deny that there may be, such a surprise in store for the confident partisans of Mr. Roosevelt this year. It would be amazing, it would be disheartening, if it should appear that the campaign discussion of his faults as an Executive, some of them incompatible with the honor of the Nation, while others are a source of danger to its peace and security, and the defiance of public decency involved in putting forward Mr. Cortelyou to drum up funds from the corporations had influenced no large number of voters.

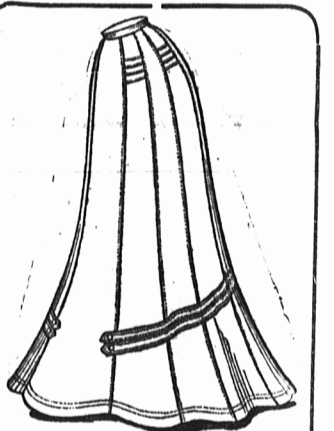
