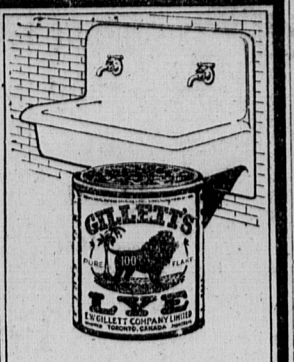

may exist among persons who are not physically contiguous in space. It is provided, for example, by a common language, a common religion, common political ideas, common nationality often in a small degree by the influence of a common favorite newspaper.

How far are the tendencies of the individual transformed by membership in such a psychological "crowd"? Dr. Stewart considered this question from three points of view: (a) How does a crowd think? (b) How does a crowd feel? (c) How does a crowd tend to act?

CROWD PSYCHOLOGY

In respect of thinking, the lecturer said that one's power to reason is distinctly lowered by membership in a crowd. One is thus rendered a far easier prey to fallacious arguments, as is seen by the sort of "proof" that passes muster in an excited mass meeting, through it would be at once rejected by the solitary thinker in his study chair at home. To borrow a medical metaphor, there is a state of lowered immunity against the bacillus of falsehood. The crowd is exceedingly "suggestible." In feeling, similarly, it is easily swayed by emotional waves, starting with a few. There is lowered sense of individual responsibility, as for example in that "kangaroo spirit" of which psychologists of childhood and youth speak so much. This result may be for good as well as for evil. If the "tone" of a school is better or worse than that of any individual boy or girl, the effect will be for good or for evil accordingly. Dr. Stewart spoke here of the military spirit, and the manifold methods by which a corporate disposition is created in those who wear the same uniform. On the side of action, the crowd was described as impulsive, capable of extraordinary feats either of heroism or of cruelty such as would not be found in the behaviour of the single person by himself. These, the lecturer said, are elements of profound disturbance in the human mind. And we cannot escape their influence. All of us belong to some crowd or other, and an important factor making for our safety is just the fact that we belong to so many psychological crowds at once. "Their boundaries overlap, the bias engendered in one sphere is more or less neutralized and corrected by the bias of that we draw from another." Our wisdom lies in becoming aware of those diverse impelling forces of which we must take account, so that we may strike so far as we can the healthy mean among the lines of thought and feeling and behaviour which they prompt.
