# ACTION STUFF

Water: \$8. a Barrel

There's a man from Arizona I know who shivers whenever he sees anybody use more than a finger's depth of water for any purpose whatever—even as a beverage. Years in a dry land have graven deep on his brain the high value of the fluid.

Which serves to introduce the episode of the first in the Artic at Greenwater, California.

Greenwater used to be a copper camp situated on a shelf of the Funeral Mountains, with Death Valley stretched out below in all its grim lifelessness. It is a dead town now—deserted and rotting to dust.

It is hard to paint a picture of Death Valley for the uninitiated about as difficult as describing the mountains fresh from the restorers of Creation bounding a flat plain of sand with the glare of an acetylene flame striking up from its miles of tenantless space; whirlwinds of dust waving here and there like tawny flames—something like that is Death Valley. And Greenwater, perched dizzily on its rocks shelf above all, was a miserable huddle of tents and board shacks blistering in the terrific desert heat.

The town had leaped into being overnight, as is the custom of boom mining towns in the Southwest. Wild men were sinking prospect shafts and driving tunnels into the resistant rock everywhere about. Occasionally you would find one prone on the sand and with his head in the scanty shade of a greasewood bush, the size of a woman's fan; lying there and talking to himself "Loco" from the heat.

Greenwater got its water from Ash Springs, eighteen miles distant. It was hauled by a water cart making two trips a day. Whenever that water cart drew

high town all the pack mules tethered by the can dumps would go mad at the sound of tinkling chain traces; a perpetual thirst was their hard portion.

That Ash Springs water, with alkali and a little green, retailed at \$8 a barrel.

Now the proprietor of the Artic saloon—ironically so named—had a sign hanging over his bar: "Free wash with every six-bit drink. The free wash meant a finger of water poured into a tin basin. When the purchaser of a six-bit drink—and no liquors sold for less than that had had his wash on the house, the bartender would take the residue and tenderly pour it on a pot of geraniums in the window. One tiny spot of green and red in the dun despair of the Furnerals was the geranium plant.

One day a carelessly thrown cigarette started a small fire in the Artic during the night rush when half the camp was lined up before the bar. The bartender tried to beat the fire out with a sack and failed. Somebody suggested he pour water on it.

"At eight bucks the barrel? I guess not!" that bartender was scornful.

That started an argument, which was carried on with great heat until the mounting fire forced the debaters to move out to the street.

Men were ready to fight for their opinions in fact some did. The list of the contention was this: Was it cheaper to put out the fire with water worth \$8 a barrel or let the saloon burn and rebuild with lumber hauled from Dagget at a cost of \$60 a thousand feet?

The matter was decided rather definitely by the complete destruction of the Artic.

## Notable Career of Late Dr. Norton

The following obituary notice appeared in the Chester, Pennsylvania Times of February 29th:

Dr. Frederick O. Norton, professor to New Testament Literature

"That is not what I ask you. Did he offer it? Of course he did not. Not he. Yet would not a friend have helped you at once and where he could?"

"I say again, you are unjust to him. You forget that, after all, he was under no necessity to promise anything."

"Oh, yes he was. There was his Duchess, as you've told me. Dirty Bess can be importunate, and she commands him. He goes notoriously in terror of her. Yielding to her importunities he promised that which he will avoid fulfilling."

He grew conscious that Colonel Holles was staring at him, amazed by his sudden vehemence. He checked abruptly, and laughed. "I grow hot for nothing at all. Nay, not for nothing—for you, old friend, and against those who put this deception upon you. You should not have come back to England, Randal. But since you're here, at least do not woo disappointment by nourishing your hopes on empty promises." He raised his glass to the light, and looked at the Colonel solemnly across the top of it. "I drink to your better fortune, Randal."

Mechanically, without answering a word, the Colonel drank with him. His heart was turned to lead.

"If you are right," he said slowly his eyes upon the table, "I may as well take your advice, and hang myself."

"Almost the only thing left for a self-respecting man in England," said Tucker.

"Or anywhere else, for that matter. But why so bitter about England in particular?"

Dr. Norton addressed the Rotary Club of Chester on February 19, a day after he had confided to his wife that he was ill. Two days later he was one of the main speakers at the Chester Teachers' Institute, and again concealed his illness from his audience and made a splendid address. The following day he was admitted to the Chester Hospital to undergo an operation for his serious ailment.

He was a graduate of Drake University and came to Crozier Seminary two years ago, as the successor of Dr. Eugene C. Ayres. He was one of the most popular members of the faculty and in theological and educational circles, was regarded as one of the ablest authorities on New Testament Literature in the east. Plans for the funeral have not been announced.

His death cast a pall of gloom over the seminary this morning as no inking was apparent over the seriousness of his condition. A delegation of professors and students waited upon Mrs. Norton and the son and daughter to convey their sympathy.

Dr. Norton was Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, Drake University, for a number of years. During his time here Professor Norton has ably demonstrated his ability in the classroom and in educational administration, his experience as teacher in Classics, as professor of New Testament language and literature and for several years professor of Educational Psychology furnishing the background for his professorship here.

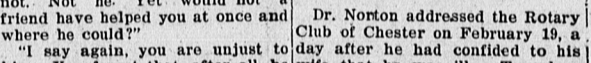
Dr. Norton was born February 3, 1868 at Brudenell, Prince Edward Island, Canada, son of Frederick Peter and Ann Rosina (Davis) Norton. He was a student of the Prince of Wales College, Prince Edward Island, Canada, pursuing his studies abroad and subsequently received from another institution his degree of Bachelor of Arts and highest honors as valedictorian.

In Transylvania College he received his Master of Arts degree in 1893. He as a classical graduate of the College of the Bible, Lexington, Kentucky 1895 and a fellow of the University of Chicago, 1903-1906, and received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1906.

He was married to Miss Florence L. Minter, of LaBelle, Missouri, November 9, 1904, and is survived by his widow and two children, Minter, age 18, a junior in Swarthmore College and Roberta, age 14, a junior in the Chester High School. He is also survived by one brother in Winnipeg and one brother and sister in Prince Edward Island, Canada.

He was principal of the grammar school, Hamilton, Prince Edward Island, Canada, from 1888 to 1889; principal of High School, New Glasgow 1889-1891; principal, 1895-1900, Western College, La Belle, Missouri; professor of Latin and Philosophy Christian University, Canton, Missouri, 1898-1899; instructor in the University High School of Chicago 1903-1906; professor of New Testament, 1906-1918; dean of the College of Liberal Arts 1907-u. p. and professor of Educational Psychology 1919 Drake University. He was a member of the Army Educational Corps as registrar, American Soldiers, in University of Paris, 1915.

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Dr. Norton was a member of the graphical and Historical Study of "The Rise of Christianity." He was also a contributor to magazine of the N. E. A. Kappa Delta Psi Bible School Community" (co-since; and a speaker on educational University Club; Frontier Club; author) 1912; and his latest book, topics and has quite frequently delivered public addresses.

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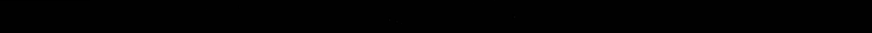
