## One Million Tons British Coal for U.S.

DUBLIN, August 2.—Harry Boland, former envoy of the "Irish Republican" to the United States was shot and probably mortally wounded today when Free State troops raided a hotel at Skerrin's just north of Dublin.

The hotel, suspected as a rebel stronghold was rushed by the Free Staters who had been informed that Boland, Secretary and right hand man of Eamonn De Valera, leader of the Irreconcilables, was in hiding there.

Boland, when called upon to surrender, refused to take any part in the government troops. He was fired upon and seriously wounded and taken to a hospital in a dying condition under guard.

The government of Michael Collins has searched Ireland for several weeks for Boland and De Valera, believing if they were captured the Irish revolt would soon be over.

Boland was well known as a leader of the Republican movement and has held steadfastly against adoption of the treaty that formed the Irish Free State. A shoe clerk when the Sinn Fein movement started, Boland rose quickly in the councils of the insurgents. He was a brilliant orator and stump speaker. He has been in appeals for funds to aid the Irish Republican movement. The envoy maintained an office in Washington for months.

## Newfoundland to West Indies Direct

ST. JOHN, Nfld., Aug. 2.—The Government of Newfoundland will open an all year freight service between St. John's Newfoundland and West Indies in October, if steamers can be procured at a reasonable figure, it is announced here. One boat would leave St. John's every six weeks, under the plan, and should conditions warrant, another would be added in October, 1922, and a three weeks' service maintained. The southern ports of call include Havana, San Juan, Jamaica, Porto Rico, Martinique, Barbados, Trinidad, and other West Indies points. Tenders are being asked for two suitable steamers of about two thousand deadweight capacity and with first class accommodation for twenty passengers, their speed to be about twelve knots.

Newfoundland fish exports to the West Indies are carried chiefly in wooden bottoms with the result, it is stated, that there is often a glut of the market and seldom a continuous supply. Fish shipped by steamers goes via Nova Scotia. Last year Newfoundland exports to the West Indies totalled \$1,378,212, and the government believes this figure could be doubled, and that last year's import value of \$796,698, could be increased. The objective, under a direct steamship service, direct importation of bananas and other fruit, as well as molasses with a great saving in transport costs and intermediary profits. Importation of raw sugar cane with a view of refining it here, is also suggested.

## Rothschild Is Being Sued

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—James Henri De Rothschild son of Baron Henri De Rothschild, head of the famous Rothschild family of France, was sued for \$500,000 damages in state supreme court today by Marie Forquet a French girl who alleged she came here last spring upon his promise to marry her and he has since refused to fix a date for the marriage. A statement issued by the Baron's counsel, former state Senator Edgar T. Brackett, declared the French Nobleman "denies most strenuously the statements of the plaintiff." The statement said the Barin is now in Paris. The papers filed today showed the complaint was served in him here at 375 Park Avenue, yesterday.
