Island its greater population in its rural parts is the small holding of from one to ten acres. When occupied by an able bodied man he would obtain many day's employment in the busy seasons on near by large farms that need more help.

And there are in the world today not only thousands but millions of pensioners and dependents of the slain, all with an assured and regular income for the rest of their lives. To many of these such small holdings (situated alongside of a national highway, with motor bus service and in touch with good schools) on Prince Edward Island with its low cost of living, its glorious climate, its healthy air and purest water, would offer an irresistible attraction.

The Federal Government is ready to largely assist in the provision of such holdings as these. The rest is up to us!

NOTES.

The government of Canada will provide forty per cent of the cost of a permanent roadway.

That is a big start!

The construction of such a roadway and the erection of a few hundred homes would bring the provision of electric wires from end to end of the province within easy reach carrying the comforts of electric light and power to thousands of farms.

The marketing of the products of small holdings would have to be taken up energetically and along the best co-operative lines. The organization of the departments of Agriculture could be looked to for much assistance.

The produce of such small holdings would be widely varied and the returns therefrom would generally be supplemental to other sources of income. Most holders would probably give their particular attention to one line such as Poultry, Small Fruits, Furs, Bees, Onions, Mixed Vegetables, Rabbits, Flowers, Pet Stock; and also Jam Making, Carpentry and Handicrafts of many kinds.

Fur Sales

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—With sales of close to \$750,000 bring the total for the week so far to approximately \$4,750,000, the fifth day of the annual winter fur auction sales now being held in this city. Black wolfskins brought the record price of \$50, each for the best pelts. American Opposum did much better than was expected bidders running the price for the best skins up to \$2.04. Buyers at today's sale said that the prices for American opposum were at about 20 per cent higher than those bought last week at the St. Louis sale. Wolf sold rather low, the best price being \$20.75, the best price paid for lynx was \$38.50. Both were on the same level as those bought last week in St. Louis. The following changes were made—Chinese Civet cat, unchanged, squirrel 20 per cent. up; wild cat northern 20 per cent. down; southern 30 per cent. down; lynx 15 per cent. down.

American opposum 7½ per cent. down; Australian opposum 10 per cent. down; wofie northern 30 per cent lower; southwestern 40 per cent. lower.
