"Swanee River" At Prince Edward

The beloved and famous melodies that are America's only real folk music, and the thrilling story of the man who wrote them, came to the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday in a magnificent Technicolor motion picture, "Swanee River", the story of Stephen C. Foster, the great American troubadour.

One leaves the theatre with ears ringing with the melodies that seem to express the very heart of America - "The Old Folks at Home" (Swanee River), "Old Black Joe", "My Old Kentucky Home", "De Campmetown Races", "Jennie with the Light Brown Hair", "Ring, Ring de Banjo" and "Oh! Susanna!"

One leaves, too, with a sensation of having been thoroughly stirred and thrilled by the romantic drama of Foster's story-like life. From his early struggles, the introduction of his songs by Christy's Minstrels, his meeting and romance with Jane McDowell ("Jennie with the Light Brown Hair"), and his success, to his disillusionment and disappointment, his gradual disintegration and death in a shabby Bowery rooming house, the life of Stephen Foster is made for the screen with every element that moviegoers have demanded in their entertainment.

Don Ameche plays Foster just as he was - sweet and tender, headstrong, inspired and emotionally unstable. As Jane, Andrea Leeds is a proper inspiration for some of our greatest music. Al Jolson puts on the role of Christy, the black-face minstrel man, with a humor and vigor unparalleled in his long career.

Featured in the supporting cast are Felix Bressart, Chick Chandler, Russell Hicks, George Reed and the Hall Johnson Choir, whose renditions of the Foster songs are memorable indeed.

MODERN COLLEGE GIRL WOULD MARRY EARLY

ST. LOUIS, April 22.—The fact that the modern college girl is more eager to marry than was her sister of a generation ago does not mean that she is more successful in getting a man, Dean Harriet M. Allyn told the National Association of Deans of Women here.

Dean Allyn said the modern college girl wants to marry within a year or so after graduation instead of waiting for eight or ten years, as they formerly did.

"This would make it appear that more college graduates are marrying," she said, "but according to statistics at Mount Holyoke only about 50 to 60 per cent of the alumnae have ever married. The percentage hasn't changed in recent years."

DEATH OF J. T. BOYD

TORONTO, April 22.—(CP)—James T. Boyd, 77, father of J. Errol Boyd, trans-Atlantic flyer, died today. He was general manager of the Confederation Life Association until his retirement 10 years ago.

Captain Errol Boyd was the first Canadian aviator to enter the first great war. He served with the Royal Navy's air arm. In 1930 he flew from Harbor Grace, Nfld., to the Scilly Islands, off the English coast, with Lieut. Harry Connor of the United States.

AWARDED CONTRACT FOR RADIO

Lt.-Col. K. S. Rogers was awarded the contract for the radio which will be installed in the Charlottetown Police patrol. It was announced last night following a meeting of the tender committee of the City Council. The amount of the tender was \$500.

There will be a transmitter at the police station and receiving set in the patrol. Police patrolling the City will be in contact with the station at all times and any rush calls will be picked up immediately. Formerly police were obliged to use light signals at the station and the men in the patrol were unable to contact the station from all parts of the city. At present when the lights outside the station are switched off, it is the signal for a call, but the disadvantage is that the patrol might be at the other end of the City and time is lost before the call is answered. When the radio is installed, the sergeant at the desk will be able to issue orders to the police in the patrol immediately on receipt of a call for help. Most Police patrols in other cities are equipped with this service and a notable decrease in crime has been noted in the cities where the service has been installed. The type of radio to be supplied is a Marconi.

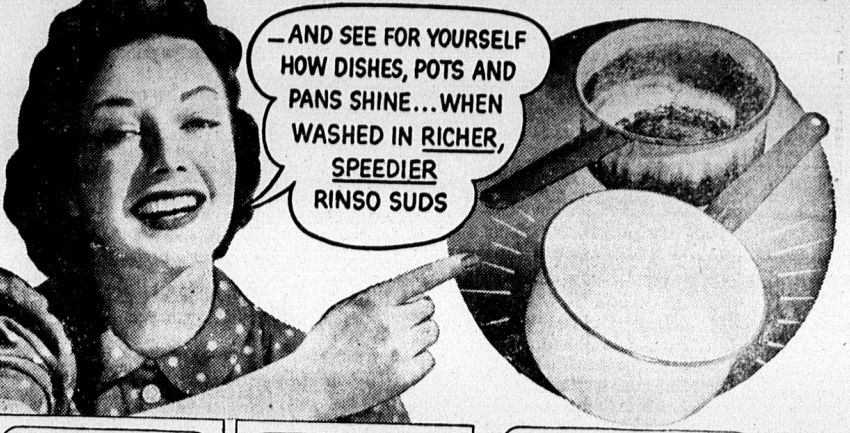
