TENNYSON SMITH DISPLEASED WITH N.B. GOVERNMENT

"Brazen Effrontery" to Permit Military Canteen in Scott Act Town Like Fredericton--Draws Big Crowds

Fredericton, Jan. 18.—Tennyson Smith continues to draw big crowds at the Opera House and many people are turned away nightly. At one meeting he made rather a sensational attack on the military canteen here. He said that the Dominion government, after establishing the Scott Act in this city had the brazen effrontery to break its own law by permitting liquor to be sold in the military canteen.

PASSING THE I. C. R. EMPLOYEES PENSION FUND

Approval Unanimous—The Revised Statues Mr. Devlin Introduced in House.

OTTAWA, January 18.—It is said Hon. Mr. Emmerson's bill to create a pension fund for employees of the Intercolonial railway was the principal item of legislation put through at yesterday's sitting of the house. It provides for a minimum allowance to each retired employe of \$30 per month, the fund to be raised by an assessment of one and one-half per cent. upon the men's wages (which are to be increased to that extent), the government to contribute an equal amount, not exceeding \$100,000 a year. The measure received the unanimous approval of the house, an especially effective endorsement of the principle being pronounced by Mr. Foster.
