**Rescued in the Nick of Time**

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The story of three days of praying in a rain and of prayers being answered in the nick of time to save them from a watery grave, was told by two women and six men of the crew of the Nova Scotia schooner, Donald J. Cook, who arrived today on tankers from Mexico, where they had been lashed by the British steamer San Eduardo.

The battered, waterlogged, hulk of the Donald J. Cook, went down less than two hours after they had been taken off, the rescued mariners declared.

The women Mrs. May Oxner, wife of the skipper, and Mrs. Bennett Peeler, wife of the cook, were unanimously voted "Heroes" of the crew, and Captain Oxner declared they would be returned to their home in Nova Scotia, and never would be taken to sea again.

The schooner sailed from Lunenburg early in December and was coasting down toward Jamaica Bay, when on December 14, by a terrific storm.

Her sails and her masts were carried away, the cabins were wrecked, and the vessel's hold filled with water. The food supply was ruined so that all went foodless for three days, before they were picked up by the San Eduardo.

Mrs. Oxner was author for the statement that the crew held a "three day praying fest," for supper. Just as they were at the point of abandoning hope, their prayers were answered by the appearance of the party led by rail for Lunenburg this morning.

**HELD IN FORGERY CHARGE IN UNITED STATES. MAN MASQUERADES IN R. C. M. P. UNIFORM**

WABASHA, Minn., Feb. 4.—A man giving his name as J. W. Davies, who was wearing a uniform of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and is believed to be a deserter from the United States army, was arrested here late yesterday and is being held for the Minneapolis police on a charge of forgery.

Davies, according to John R. Foley, county attorney, has represented himself as working under the direction of W. J. Wright, British vice consul at Minneapolis, in a search for a man impersonating a Canadian Mounted Police officer. It is alleged that Davies forged Wright's name to a cheque for \$25.

Letters addressed to "Roy Davies" were found in Davies' pockets. A man named Beavis detected on January 19 from the Mexican detachment of the army contingent stationed at Fort Snelling, Minn. It is understood that connection with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.
