BAND at the Rink tonight.

The ladies' hockey match has been indefinitely postponed.

PRINCE EDWARD Island estimates were passed in the Commons Saturday.

At St. James church last night Master & lace McDonald sang "One Sweetly solemn Thought."

COURIER McNeve left Bonshaw shortly after noon Saturday and reached the city about four o'clock.

The Dining Hall of the Victoria Hotel has been artistically decorated for the Paardeberg Dinner, tonight.

The Legislature at its rising on Saturday afternoon adjourned by order of the Lieutenant Governor till Tuesday April 4th at three o'clock.

CAPT. BROWN has asked Mr. Lord to have one or two practical men of the Board of Trade to go on the Stanley to investigate the conditions.

STOCK Farm cattle were disposed of by auction as follows on Friday: F. L. Drake, two cows, \$127; Barrett Henderson, heifer, \$51; Saunders & Newsome, cow, \$70; E. Wheatley, cow, \$51. The cattle averaged \$90 per head.

ALL day Saturday crowds of citizens were at St. Dunstan's cutting, watching the three engine snow plough fighting the drifts. The spot was reached by snow shoes and skis and Superintendent Sharp was among the spectators.

In the list of officials for the Legislature the name of Sergeant at Arms D. L. Hooper was inadvertently omitted. Mr. Hooper has always proved a most courteous official and no one could be more generally acceptable to both sides of the House.

FRIENDS of E. L. Head, Hazelbrook, will regret to learn of the sudden death, Saturday morning, at the home of Benj. Aitkin, of his son Arthur Poole Head, aged seven years. The little fellow had been ill for some days with sore throat but no serious consequences were anticipated.

The Montreal Star of recent date makes very favorable mention of Prof. Leigh R. Gregor's edition of Die Journalisten, a comedy by Gustav Freytag. Professor Gregor who is instructor of German in McGill is a native of Brackley Point.

The young lad, Frank McAulay, who is under arrest for committing sundry offences at the Victoria Hotel where he was well known, is evidently a victim of cheap literature. In his room have been found a large number of blood curdling dime novels and his outfit included files, a dark lantern and a revolver.

A THRU despatch of Saturday says: Thursday night's hockey match is the talk of the town. Although the news papers stories of a rough game are drawn in a somewhat humorous vein, the players who contested, declare they had the one experience of playing a drawn game with death, and they don't want another.

AFTER an attempt has been made to get down some pressed hay from Upper Sackville, the N. B. and P. E. I. Railway will pay off its men and go out of commission till some fundamental change takes place in the weather. It is estimated that to open up the track to Cape Tormentine will cost not far from \$1,000.—Sackville Ex.

At the Police Court Saturday, Frank McAulay, bell boy at the Victoria was arraigned on the following charges: (1) Theft of a silver dollar from John J. Mahar, commercial traveller. (2 and 3) Theft of \$3 from Mr. Gordon and A. L. Fraser. (4) Theft of a diamond from Mrs. Sterns. Evidence was heard on all the cases and an adjournment was then made till this morning for judgment.

CAPTAIN LUKE HOLMES, now in command of the steamer Cacouna, will leave her this trip and will take a position ashore with the Dominion Coal Company, to superintend the discharging of different steamers of that Company. He will be succeeded by Captain A. F. MacDonald, who is taking the Bonavista on the present trip, and the latter vessel on her return will again be taken by Capt. Fraser.—Halifax Herald.

A CORRESPONDENT from Lower Barney's River N. S. writing to the New Glasgow Chronicle says:—The gulf to the westward far as we can see, is completely packed with ice, but at Arisaig and Cove there are several open stretches of water extending far beyond the east of Pictou Island. We don't see why the mails from P. E. Island could not be landed there and conveyed to the I. C. R. If the Island people were in anyway anxious about this matter, the difficulty might soon be overcome.

THE catches of smelts in Casapeque Bay have been quite large of late, one man taking as high as 700 lbs. in one day. The prices paid by local buyers range from 5 to 7 cents per pound. The P. E. Island smelt fishermen have again been called on to suffer loss on account of the lack of effective winter steamboat communication with the mainland. Over 500 boxes valued at over \$2,000 were removed from the delayed Government steamer Stanley at Georgetown.—Fishing Gazette.

WORD was received by Prof. J. A. McDonald of P. W. College Saturday afternoon of the death of his father, Ronald McDonald, aged 63 years, at Souris, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The deceased had undergone treatment in the Charlottetown Hospital but it was not till recently that his illness took a serious turn which resulted in his demise. The bereaved ones left to mourn include a widow, two sons and four daughters. The sons are John A. and Frank, the latter at home and the daughters, Clara McDonald, Mary and Margaret all of whom are in Boston.

Halifax and other parts of the Maritime Provinces will have an athletic attraction next summer, when two provincial young men who have made their standing in the States in athletics, will come down. They are William L. Pendergast and S. P. Gillies. Gillies is a native of Margaree, C. B., and the son of a merchant of Kensington. P. E. I. Mr. Gillies is rated as second to Finngan at the 10-pond hammer throwing in New York, and he has thrown the 12-pound hammer, 190 feet in practice. He has more than a dozen medals for his last summer's work. In the last athletic exhibition at Madison Square Garden, New York, Pendergast was featured as a hammer thrower. These two athletes intend giving exhibitions through the provinces next season in all-round weight throwing, jumping and hurdling.—Halifax Herald.

THE South African veterans in the city, about twenty in all attended divine service at St. James yesterday morning where an eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. T. F. Fullerton. A very appropriate and touching reference was made to the Island boys who had fallen at Paardeberg.

THREE passed peacefully away at Murray Harbor South, yesterday morning (Sunday) John Hanley, aged 68 years. The deceased leaves a widow, besides a widow, three step children, via George Muford, of the Mark Wright Furnishing Co., James Muford, New York and Enoch Muford, B. C.

Their preliminary hearing will come up at the Police Court this morning.
