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## Rotarians Hear Address By Mr. LePage

"Mass Distribution of Merchandise and its Application to the Present Unemployment Situation," was the subject of an address at Rotary luncheon yesterday by Rotarian B. W. LePage, M.L.A.

Mr. LePage said that the most tragic thing confronting Canada as well as other nations today, is the great army of youth leaving schools and colleges educated, trained and equipped, but unable to get jobs. This situation, coupled with the fact that nearly one tenth of Canada's population have no means of a livelihood, is, to say the least, alarming.

One of the causes is an uncontrolled economic system which has taken the business out of the hands of the masses and put it into the hands of the wealthy classes, creating over six hundred millionaires in Canada.

During the early nineties this country was dotted from coast to coast with thousands of thriving villages in which there were prosperous business houses giving employment to thousands in the distribution of goods and the shipping of products of the land, sea, forests and mines. There were tradesmen of all kinds, and in practically every village there were manufacturing plants. Unemployment was unheard of. Every community did its own business.

In no part of Canada was there more evidence of this than in this province. Every dollar earned was kept in circulation here. In the city of Charlottetown more business was done thirty years ago than today. The value of farm village and city property was increasing in value.

Nowadays, the speaker said, villages are no longer doing the business. In most they are deserted, and the greater part of the business is being done by large corporations in the larger centres of Canada through mail order houses and chain stores. The profits of these are not used to keep the wheels of industry going, but to enrich a few at the cost of the masses. The present distribution of merchandise under the new system controlled by a few large bodies has eliminated wholesalers and great business centres which were formerly beehives of industry.

Mr. LePage asked the question: Why should any corporation in Canada be allowed more than one place of business? In one small western town, he said, one American concern has five groceries.

He contended that these large concerns are able to control the manufacturer, and the average merchant is not put on a competitive basis. Whatever little the people may gain by reduction in prices, they lose thereby the local employment of their boys and girls.

Mr. LePage, in the course of his address, stated that the mail order houses and chain stores are not paying taxes, and the provincial and city governments should get at least \$25,000 in taxes from them.

Rotarian J. Leale Stacey was in the chair, and there was one guest, Mr. S. R. Finlayson, Manager of the Bank of Montreal.

## State Aid For Unwed Mothers Under Nazi Rule

BERLIN, Feb. 12.—The rule was laid down today that prospective mothers of illegitimate children in future will be cared for by the Nazi State.

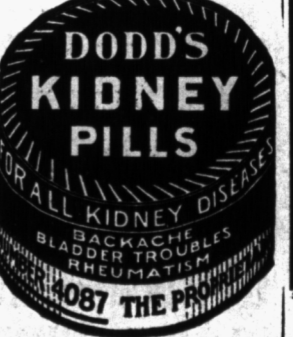
Addressing 25,000 women in the Sports Palace Saturday night, Erich Hilgenfeldt, newly appointed party women's leader, declared that "We Nazis believe in life. Therefore, we will go to the unwed expectant mother and help her without assuming to condemn her."

"In my opinion," he said, "this represents a much higher moral standard than existing here."

Robert Ley, Chancellor Hitler's Trade Union commissioner, attacked women's church societies with the comment "these are nice sisters of mercy whose love of their neighbor extends only to religious societies." Referring to Catholics, Ley said the concordat with the Vatican would be respected but that cleavage to nation along religious lines would not be tolerated.

Envisaging war, he said "when man, who is the natural leader, is out defending the country, we need German woman leadership at home, and the Nazi women's movement supplies it when the time comes."
