SURPRISE PARTY.—A very pleasant and profitable evening was spent at the home of Miss Barbara McKay, Pleasant Valley, on May 11th, when a large number of friends gathered in the form of a surprise party to bid farewell to Miss McKay. Alexander McDonald, who presided during the evening addressed Miss McKay, after which Mack McLeod read the following address: "To Miss Barbara McKay—We your friends have met together in your home to spend a few hours with you before your departure from Pleasant Valley. There is always a feeling of regret when our neighbors leave the old home. But when it is one with whom we have been closely associated as friend and companion for years, the loss is all the more keenly felt. We wish though to tell you here tonight that we will miss you from our social life in our homes, and the church. In many of our homes you have proved a helpful and dear friend. While in our church life your assistance in the choir and Sabbath School will be all the more missed. But the future awaits us all. We cannot always abide in the home. The fitting time comes, and we would not only wish to express regrets at your departure but to cheer you with words of good courage and heartfelt wishes for yours, for your success, and further to assure you of the welcome that awaits you from the kind friends when the wheels of time bring you homeward once again. As a small token of our friendship we ask you to accept this gift which carries with it all good wishes for health and happiness. With you in friendships bond, the friends of Bradabane and Pleasant Valley. Mr. Stanley Sharpe then presented Miss McKay with a purse. Miss McKay thanked her friends in a very pleasing manner for their generous gift and their kind thought of her; also expressed her regret of leaving her many friends. Jas. McSwain and Walter McKenzie then made some very suitable remarks. Hugh McKay very suitably spoke in behalf of his sister. Lunch

was then served by the ladies present. After all had partaken, the remaining hours of the evening were spent in music and games. All returned home feeling they had spent a very pleasant evening.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.—A very sad drowning accident occurred on the evening of June 5th, 1914, when Alex. Stewart of the firm of McLeod & Stewart, Pictou Island, N.S., met a watery grave. Mr. Stewart, together with his partners, Messrs. Norman and John D. McLeod, launched a dory in order to land their gasoline boat, fearing disaster to her as she was seen to drag her anchor. Owing to the storm of the previous night, there was a heavy sea running, and consequently a strong undertow, they, however, succeeded in pulling a short distance of the boat, (which was subsequently demolished) when a huge billow struck the bow of the dory, elevating and completely overturning her, throwing the occupants into the sea. Stewart and John D. McLeod managed to grasp the dory while Norman McLeod struck out for the shore, but the force of the breakers overturning the dory, made it impossible for them to retain their hold, so they also swam towards shore; their progress, however, was retarded by the heavy oilskins and sea boots which they wore, but, all three being extra swimmers, bravely kept afloat, though buffeted by the seas, and dashed among the breakers. Meanwhile the fishermen on the beach, seeing their unfortunate companions, were wildly running to and fro, when Jas. Richards launched a dory and called for volunteers to the rescue, but the sea ran mountains high, danger sometimes intimidates the bravest and life is precious; Francis Horton and David Bell joined hands and rescued Norman McLeod who was scarcely able to grasp the extended oar. John D. McLeod, seeing the struggle for life in the surf, resorted his strength then bravely battled with the waves, until he was rescued in an exhausted condition. Stewart was fattest out, and as he neared the shore, his head was seen to droop, then, as he rose on the crest of a wave which bore him shoreward, Francis Horton assisted by David Bell grasped him and pulled him into the boat, but too late as life was found to be extinct. He was quickly carried ashore and, although they labored persistently over him for upwards of two hours all efforts at resuscitation proved futile. The above tragedy has cast a gloom over Pictou Island where Mr. Stewart was well and favorably

known, having been in the lobster business there for upwards of ten years. Every tribute of respect was shown him by his employees, fellow partners, Mr. Lewis, manager of the firm of P. McGee, with whom the deceased had, frequently, business transactions, showing genuine sorrow and sympathy by offering every assistance and sending the steamer "Acadia" with the remains accompanied by his fellow partners and almost the entire population of P. Island, to his home at Little Sands from whence the funeral was held on the following day.
