

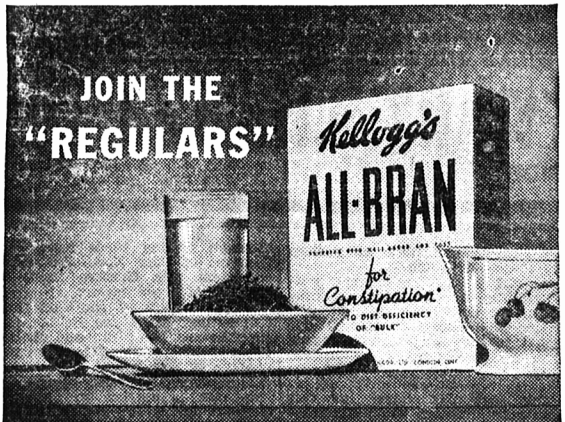

Vote on Peace When It Comes

LONDON, Nov. 23.—(CP) — Arthur Greenwood, deputy leader of the Labor opposition in the House of Commons, has declared the British electorate must be given an opportunity of expressing its views on the lines peace terms shall take as soon as possible after an armistice.

The House was arguing a bill which included suspension of publication of the register of Parliamentary voters possibly for even longer than the end of the war.

Greenwood admitted if war continued and a general Parliamentary election became impracticable it might be that the government would ask for prolongation of its life. While that was not a prospect Labor regarded with enthusiasm it might be secured.

But, he declared, whatever the nature of the government which had conducted the war and brought it to a successful armistice, there must be a general election. "It is of vital importance for the future of the world that when the thunder of war has died away and we with other nations have to face the gigantic task of making peace permanent the votes of the men and women of this country shall be heard."
