At the Charlottetown Police Court this morning Wallace Carr, was fined \$5 or 30 days for using insulting and abusive language and Joseph Nicholson for being drunk was dismissed it being his first appearance.

The Hunter River Methodist Sabbath School will hold their annual Rally day services in the Church on Sunday next, Sept. 29th, at 3 p.m. Mrs. (Rev.) J. B. Gough will deliver the address and the collection will be in aid of the Sunday School Fund.

The eastern express arrived in Charlottetown today at 8.15 a. m., on time; the southern accommodation at 10.10 a. m., thirty-five minutes late; the Cape Traverse accommodation at 10.10 a. m., fifteen minutes late; and the Tignish accommodation at 11.50 a. m., ten minutes late.

On Saturday evening Wutherland MacKay, younger son of D. N. MacKay, Springfield, was so seriously injured in the throat, by being gored by a vicious cow, that it necessitated his removal to the P. E. Island Hospital, where he was operated upon by Drs. Jenkins and MacGuigan. The Guardian is pleased to learn that the little fellow is doing nicely.

Preaching in Carleton Methodist Church yesterday, Rev. H. E. Thomas, the pastor, made a strong attack on Pastor Russell, of New York, and his teaching. Mr. Thomas made charges of a sensational nature and declared that Pastor Russell's teaching was antagonistic to Protestantism and Roman Catholicism alike.—St. John exc. Mr. Thomas was formerly of Charlottetown.

The following market prices from a Fredericton, N. B., exchange will be of interest for comparison in this Province:—"There was a fairly large country market although the condition of the roads no doubt kept a number of the farmers from bringing their produce to the market. Eggs were quite plentiful and sold at 25 to 28 cents per dozen. Butter sold at 23 to 25 cents per pound and apples were selling at \$1 per barrel. Veal brought from 6 to 11 cents, while lamb sold from 75 to \$1.50 per quarter. Beef was selling at 6 to 8 cents and mutton sold at 5 to 9 cents and chickens at 75 cents to \$1 per pair. Potatoes brought from \$1 to \$1.20 a barrel."

A Moncton exchange says that it is reported that Monsignor LeBlanc will be consecrated Bishop of the St. John diocese sometime next month. In Moncton, this week, a meeting of representative Acadians was held to arrange for a large representation of Acadians at the consecration ceremony. Rev. D. Leger called the meeting to order and explained his objects. His Honor Judge Landry, who was the first speaker, said:—"The consecration of the first Acadian bishop constituted a memorable day in the history of the country and should furnish the Acadians—men, women and children—an occasion to participate in making an offering to the new prelate on his elevation to the high dignity of Bishop of St. John. This would testify also the gratitude of the Acadians to the Holy See.—On the executive committee is F. J. Buote of P. E. I. and Inspector Theriault of the Magdalen Islands and many are expected to attend from P. E. Island.

Rev. W. H. Van Allen, of the Church of the Advent, Boston, preached at both services in the Mission Church, yesterday. His fine address made a great impression on the large audience. At the evening service he preached in the form of worship in the Church of England and Daughter Churches. He traced the early history of the church and reviewed the many oppositions raised against the more elaborate form of service as in vogue in the high church. He presented some telling arguments in favor of the ritualistic service and referred to passages in the Book of Common Prayer by which anyone could satisfy himself as to the teachings of the church. Dr. Van Allen will go to Prince Edward Island this week and will return to spend the first Sunday in October at the Cathedral in Fredericton.—St. John exc.

The quarterly session of the Queen's County District Lodge, I. O. G. T., met at Marshfield, P. E. I., on Sept. 19th. It proved to be an interesting and profitable meeting, there being about thirty present, among whom there were six ministers. Eleven new members, seven gentlemen and four ladies, took the District Degree, making a membership of 61 in the District Lodge. Altogether the subordinate lodges, I. O. G. T., now have a total membership of 380 in Queen's County. Favorable reports were heard from all the subordinate lodges, at present there being eleven, four new lodges being organized by the National Organizer, S. H. Webb, since the last session, including one in Charlottetown. After the usual order of business discussions on vital questions in connection with the temperance cause took place. It is suggested that the next session be on all day one, so as to more fully attend to that part of the work. A public meeting was held in the evening, at which there was a crowded house. Interesting addresses were delivered by the Revs. J. Hawley, Z. L. Fash, L. J. Watson and S. F. Tarbush. His Honor Lieutenant Governor Rogers deeply regretted that he could not be present. A very pleasing program was also rendered.

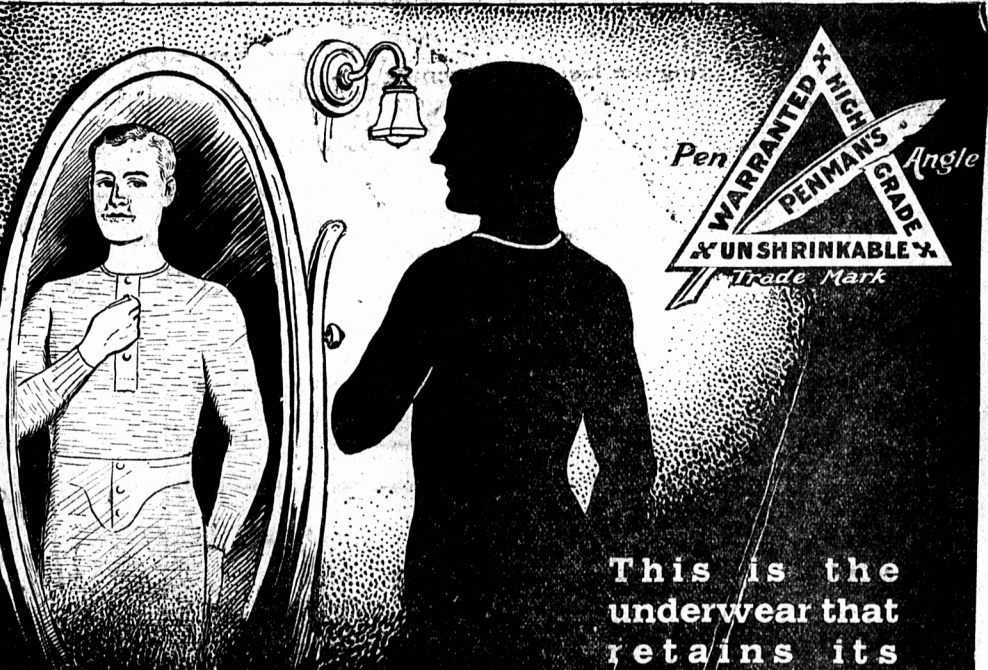
