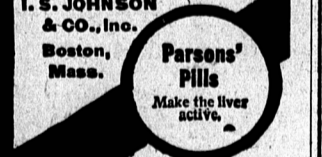

REGINA, Sask., Oct. 21.—Snow began falling at 9.30 o'clock to-day and threshing is again postponed. Hon. W. R. Matherwell, minister of agriculture, said he did not anticipate any serious result from the recent snow fall, but what was formerly line wheat may be dropped in grade as a result. Some grain may be threshed through by anxious farmers. The movement of crop this year has shattered all previous records, and but for the tie-up resulting from recent storms, the railways would have been tied up.
