DANGERS TO PEACE.

These are critical days for the peace of the world. On the eastern shores of Asia during eight months past blood has been poured out; the water in the Straits has been dyed red between Russia and Japan. But the actual struggle has been so distant from Europe and America and the centres of modern civilization that we have been little disturbed.

The situation is greatly complicated by the relations of the various powers with each other. Britain is the ally of Japan, pledged to come to the assistance of the latter with all the might of her Empire should Japan be assailed by more than nominal power. France is the ally of Russia, by a compact the terms of which are secret.

The blow struck has been followed by a stern demand for apology and reparation. This was at first promised, since delayed, now followed by excuses and attempted justification. Meanwhile as the Baltic fleet, stained with British blood, moves on its way to the East, Britain is mobilizing her fleets in the Channel, the Mediterranean and on the far Pacific.

The Russian Baltic fleet is now in a position where it can speedily unite with one or other of the formidable fleets of France, on the Atlantic or in the Mediterranean. At this writing France has given no sign. We believe that her Government and people desire peace and friendly relations with Britain. But she may be bound, we know not by what hard conditions, to fight side by side with Russia should the latter become embroiled with Britain. It may be the purpose of secret Russian counsels to force Britain into the conflict, and by bringing on a general war to cover her defeats and humiliations in the Far East.

We know that British statesmen will avoid war if it can honorably be avoided.

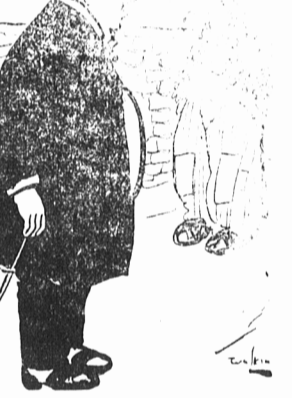
