It should be distinctly understood by the travelling public that the East bound evening mail express does not stop at the Summerside station nor at the recently built siding, and that passengers from the steamer for Summerside are expected to get off as best they can. The train arrives at Souris at 2.35, and a procession headed by the Souris Band and members of Court St. John will march to the Public Hall, when the High Court will open at 4 o'clock, local time. A public meeting will be held Wednesday night. It is expected that the High Court will conclude its session on Thursday night, the special leaving Souris at 6.05, reaching Summerside at midnight.
