

3,000 NEW YORK WOMEN MARCH FOR VOTES

NEW YORK, May 7—"All they need," observed one young old man, and he voiced the sentiments of the jam of folks that lined Fifth Avenue yesterday afternoon from curb back to the building line on either side of the street to watch America's first big equal suffrage parade, "all they need is a parade of girls like that one at the head of the parade and they'll get my vote to vote."

"That one" was Miss Alberta Hill, tall, black eyed, dazzling in a white serge suit, relieved by a brilliant green aigrette on her white hat and her "Votes for Women" sash in the

purple, white and green of the Women's Political Union. Leading the parade with her were the Misses Inez Mitholland and Sarah McPike with their large banner. One glance at that first three and even the scoffers, if any of the thousands had come to scoff at the 3,000 women marchers, began to warm up to applause.

One might see smiles here and there on the faces of the suffragettes' big audience, but the smiles were good-natured. The only jeers to be heard came, and came in plenty, when the eighty-nine mere men of the Men's League for Woman Suffrage hove into view.

Women architects, typists, aviators, explorers, nurses, physicians, actresses, shirtwaist makers, cooks, painters, writers, chauffeurs, sculptors, journalists, editors, milliners, hairdressers, "home makers," office-holders, librarians, laundresses, deco-

rators, teachers, farmers, artists' models, even pilots with a steam-boat painted on their banner—these were only a few of the groups of women and girls who filled Fifth Avenue and marched along in perfect step to the music of many brass bands and a band of Scotch pipers.

When the head of the procession reached Madison Square a glance up the avenue saw a pavement of banners, flags and pennants all the way back to the northern horizon. From a good many points of view it was the best looking parade New York has ever seen.

"And not a soul jeered so far as I could hear or see," said Miss Eleanor Gardiner, who carried the banner for the division of literary women marshalled by Mrs. Ernest Thompson-Seton in white and Miss Sarah Splint in black. Nobody laughed at all except when I was passing the

point where members of my own family were ranged along the curb. They all gave me the ha-ha."

But the Men's League for Woman Suffrage! Upton Sinclair for some reason or other was able to walk only a couple of blocks when he felt he could stroll no further and dropped out. But as the parade moved further and further to the south and Union Square more and more men with pennants joined the original brave band of eighty-nine men and swelled the trousered company to more than 100.

"Hold up your skirts, girls!" was shot from the curb toward the eighty-nine braves.

"You won't get any dinner unless you march all the way," hooted another.

"Wait till I get my wrapper and I'll join ranks too," cooed some one else from the side lines.

But when the women were marching by the attitude of the onlookers was altogether different. The side lines were not particularly demonstrative at any time along the upper avenue, but here and there outbursts of hand-clapping and sometimes cheers of approval greeted the women marchers.

"IRENE OSGOOD" MUST SURRENDER MANUSCRIPTS.

LONDON, May 6—Mrs. Irene Sherard, novelist, who writes under the name of "Irene Osgood," failed in her appeal yesterday against the decision of the Northampton County court Judge ordering her to surrender to her husband, Robert Harborough Sherard, journalist and author, certain pet animals and typewritten manuscripts of the play, "Diamonds are Trumps," a novel dealing with

the negro question.

Mr. Sherard contends that he is the real author of the novels which appeared in the last five years as written by "Irene Osgood." This is denied indignantly by Mrs. Sherard. The high court judges held that it was not necessary for the county court judge to say who was the author. Mrs. Sherard has judicial separation impending against her husband.

AFTER MEN WHO TOOK PART IN THE "COAL PARTY."

CORDOVA, Alaska, May 8—After a conference between U. S. Marshal Sullivan and District Attorney Walter it was announced yesterday that fifty warrants would be issued for arrest of the men known to have participated in the "coal party" Thursday, when Canadian coal was dump-

ed into the bay. The announcement caused a storm of protest and the officials decided to postpone action for a time and give the angry citizens a chance to regain their composure.
