EASTERN NOTES—Harvesting is still going on, and though much later than the average the crop is the best of years, but the ripening is most irregular.—Mackerel fishing is probably at an end for the season, and those who prosecuted it with energy have done fairly well.—Hake fishing may be said to be a failure on account of dog fish cutting the lines and eating the fish off the hooks, and our best fishermen after repeatedly baiting their trawls and finding nothing but the skulls and backbones clinging to the hooks gave up the business in disgust and turned their attention to mackerel fishing.—This dog fish question is certainly a problem which our governments American and Canadian have to grapple with immediately or the North Atlantic fisheries the finest in the world, will have to be abandoned.
