CHURCH PARADE.—The church parade yesterday was the largest and probably the finest military parade yet seen in Charlottetown, practically the full strength of the companies now located in the City taking part. The Protestant portion of the Battalion attended service in St. James Church and the Catholic in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, the sermon in the latter being conducted by Rev. Father Macauld. In St. James, Rev. Dr. Fulton preached a most impressive sermon on "The Equipment of a Soldier." He intimated that this would probably be their last opportunity to attend divine service in this City before going overseas and after a magnificent dissertation on Christian Character and the duties of a Christian Soldier, concluded with a most eloquent oration in which he expressed the belief and hope that on the battlefield they would quit them as men, clean men and brave, of whom their native province would have good cause to be proud. In the name of the citizens of Charlottetown and the people of the province he bade them God speed and safe return. Enjoyable features of the music service were solos by Miss Jacqueline McDonald and McArthur Bruce were also two anthems by the choir.

AUTO TRIP TO RUSTICO.—Capt. J. G. Webb, recruiting officer for the 165th French-Canadian Regiment, in company with Mr. R. H. Sterns and Lieut. Morris of the 105th Battalion and Lieut. Murphy of No. 5 Siege Battery proceeded on "Special Military Service" by automobile yesterday to Rustico. An automobile was used because it was found impossible by Capt. Webb to secure a team at any of the livery stables Saturday. The object of the trip was to address the Acadian people on the subject of recruiting on their way home from church, but as a heavy rainstorm came on at the time this could not be done. The Captain however met many of the people and was most heartily received. Arrangements were made to hold a meeting at Rustico on Wednesday night. Tonight the Captain will hold a meeting at Bloomfield in company with Capt. Legere of the 105th and Capt. Gallant and a meeting will be held tomorrow night at Miscouche. Capt. Webb states that some fifty horses were met coming and going and they showed not the least sign of alarm; the people in many cases allowing their horses to come up close to the auto and get acquainted with it. The Captain says the island roads are far better than those in Nova Scotia and much wider. There was only about a mile, of what might be called bad road on the whole journey.

HORSE RACES

ON KING'S BIRTHDAY

Saturday afternoon's Horse Races held on the Exhibition Association track proved a big success in every way.

The weather was perfect, and track excellent the attendance was upwards of one thousand who fully enjoyed the beautiful June day, the races, and the fine programme of music furnished by the 105th band. Although the races were won in three straight heats there were many surprises for the "wise ones" and in two cases the favorites were easily beaten. The big surprise in store was the performance by the Summerside entry Sister Patch in the 2.19 class trot and pace. Up to the finish of the first heat, the "wise ones" had given this race to either Dr. Sharper or Oakley H. The 2.19 class was won by a half mile performer as she was credited with a half in 58%. The unexpected happened—she paced the first mile easily in 2.18 1/2 and came back and finished the second and third heats in 2.20. She handled the race with perfect ease and looked as if she could go to a mark of 2.10. In this race Oakley H. was Joe Patchen's daughter's hardest contender and was right at her saddle all the time in the first heat. In his performance Oakley showed his old time vim and stability and made a remarkable showing against the fast pacer. To the regret of everybody Dr. Sharper was on his worst behavior and was distanced in the first heat. Princess Etta and Dixie Girl also did well considering their condition which was due to shortage of work this spring. The 2.30 class was won by another Patchen mare in Lillian Patchen, owned by Hammond Kelly. Derby gave her a hard race but the Patchen entry proved too strong. Queen Catherine another favorite, acted badly and captured fourth money only, Moth Miller winning third. The fifth mare Helen A. made a splendid showing considering it was her first appearance. The 2.40 trot was an easy class for Brenton H. Jellieco, captured second, Admiral third and Kitchener fourth. Sister Patch, winner of the 2.19 trot and pace is owned by Mr. Harry Silliphant of Summerside. She is nine years old and was purchased at the Old Glory Sale, New York, and previous to these races had a mark 2.22 1/2. She is a free legged pacer and if no mishaps occurs she will certainly be a hot contender in the Maritime Circuit this summer. The Judges were: Starter, Mr. George McDonald, City Judges; Mr. Fred Wright, Summerside; and Leonard Wood, Mt. Herbert. Times: L. B. McMillan and William Brown. The management and officials are to be congratulated for the manner in which the first race meet of the season was handled. The order and arrangements were perfect. 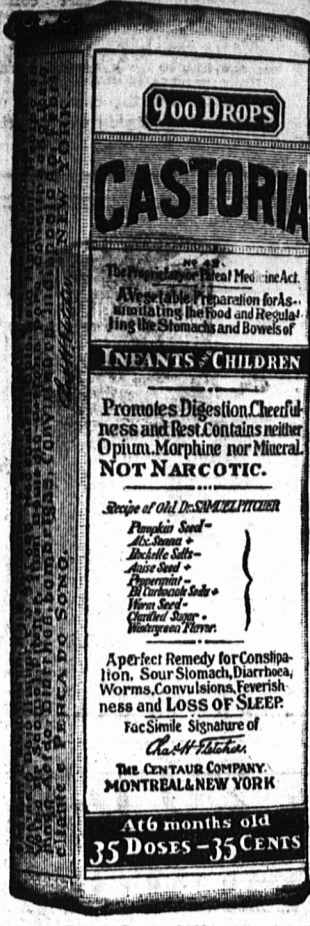
