Halifax, August 11.—The steamer Stanley arrived from Sable Island; reports no wrecks. All well.

BENJAMIN TANTON, St. Eleanor's returned home Monday evening from a trip to the Canadian Northwest.

Miss Gertie Donkin, who has been visiting at the summer residence of Mr. L. M. Poole, Rest Cottage, Keppoch, P. E. I. returned home on Aug. 6th.

Miss Marguerite Nichols of Lexington, Mass., who has been visiting Miss Mariel Massy for several weeks, left yesterday by the Northumberland on return home.

CHARLES E. MAXWELL, wife and sister, of Boston, arrived by the Northumberland last evening and passed on to Alberton, on a visit to Mr. Maxwell's mother Mrs. Wisner.

THE yachts Kelpie owned by McLeod and Grady, Defender owned by L. B. Allen and the Kohinoor owned by H. Pickett left yesterday evening for Charlottetown to take part in the races there to-morrow.

The first result of the new bye-laws, relating to spitting in public places was a fine imposed on a young man who confessed on Monday to a charge of spitting on the steps of the Post office. The fine and costs amounted to \$1.45.

The former residence of Jacob Murray of Elmsdale and also a barn which contained two binders and a mower were burned to the ground a few nights ago. The cause of the fire is unknown. The property is partially insured.

THE schooner Charlie, owned by Myrick & Co., met with a severe disaster on Friday last. While entering Tracadie Harbour she grounded, and springing a leak, was ignited from casks of lime in the hold. The schooner and cargo went up in smoke. The crew and all on board landed safely. The cargo which was insured, consisted of canning apparatus for the preserving of blueberries and was valued at \$1,000. The vessel was not insured.

THE remains of Miss Jane Backerfield formerly of Summerside, whose death occurred on Monday, were brought over by the Northumberland last night and forwarded to Alberton, for interment. The remains were accompanied by two sisters Mrs. Dixon of Buctouche and Miss Mary Backerfield, Campbellton, N. B. and a brother E. B. Backerfield of Horcourt, N. B. The funeral takes place this morning at 10 o'clock.

THE regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held Monday night. After routine John Dobson addressed the Council re the Chitamen residing in the town not paying taxes. Coun. Morris moved, seconded by Coun. Clark that the proprietor of the Chinese Laundry be taxed a licence fee of \$10 and his men \$2 each. Carried. It was moved by Coun. Clark seconded by Coun. Muttart and carried, that a committee have power to interview Geo. W. Robinson and offer him an exemption from taxes on a new plant for Roller Mill to the extent of a value of \$3,000.00, for a term of ten years.

THE death occurred at Alberton on Friday of Mrs. John L. Muttart after a long illness of several years. She was the daughter of Geo. Muttart of Augustus Cove, and leaves a husband and a family of three sons and two daughters to mourn. Two of the sons, George and Alder who are doctors and Mrs. James McGimpsey reside in Jersey City, R. I., Mrs. George Grant of Alberton and Rev. William who is not at present stationed. The funeral took place on Saturday to the Methodist Cemetery Rev. W. J. Howard officiating. To the bereaved the Guardian extends its sympathy.

AUTHORS' BLUNDERS

Some Mistakes in Which the Moon, Sun and Wind Figure.

The moon proves a terrible pitfall to most writers. Wilkie Collins once performed the marvelous feat of making it rise in the west. Rider Haggard, in "King Solomon's Mines," relies for the effective rendering of one of his most thrilling scenes upon an eclipse of the new moon.

Coleridge placed a star between the horns of the crescent moon, forgetting that to be visible in such a position the star would have to be between the earth and the moon or, say, 230,000 miles away only.

Next to the moon perhaps the sun is responsible for more glaring errors than any single concrete cause. At the beginning of a certain famous novel, the title of which a few years back was in everybody's mouth, an invalid character's face was said to have been lighted by one window looking directly toward the east. Yet at the end of the book, when the invalid dies, the author, wishing to make him depart this life in a flood of glory, suffuses this eastern windowed room with "the red glare of the setting sun."

Kingsley, too, made one of his heroes row out into the eastern ocean after the setting sun. But even this glaring absurdity has been capped. In a novel published by a well known firm there occurs the following passage, the scene being laid on board a big sailing ship: "How's the wind?" asked the skipper. "East-northeast," replied the mate, glancing at the masthead pennant, which was streaming blithely in the direction indicated." So that in the world, according to novelists, we should not only find the sun setting in the east, but pennants would "stream" against the direction of the prevailing wind.
