ROBERT TAYLOR SCORES IN POWERFUL ROLE AS MURDER SUSPECT OF "HIGH WALL"

A "crime of passion" motivates the taut plot of "High Wall," current offering at the Capitol Theatre, with Robert Taylor giving a powerful performance as a victim of amnesia who believes he has strangled his unfaithful wife but who intends to outwit the law on a plea of temporary insanity.
