AUTO LOTTERY IN AFRICA

Lottery of automobiles in South Africa has become so extensive that officials are investigating the activities of the promoters. The plan is to sell tickets, each bearing five chances, at the equivalent of 60 cents. About 4,000 tickets are sold each month. As a car valued at \$1,000 is offered monthly, the promoters not only sell a machine, but make at least \$1,400 extra. The gambling staff of the Johannesburg police force is investigating the organization in that city, the project having proved so profitable for the promoters that they are also offering houses, pianos, suites of furniture, jewelry, sewing machines, and other articles in the same manner.

When German fishermen offered five monster sharks at Lancaster, England, recently, they were paid only 50 cents apiece for two, in contrast to 10 cents a pound received in Germany.

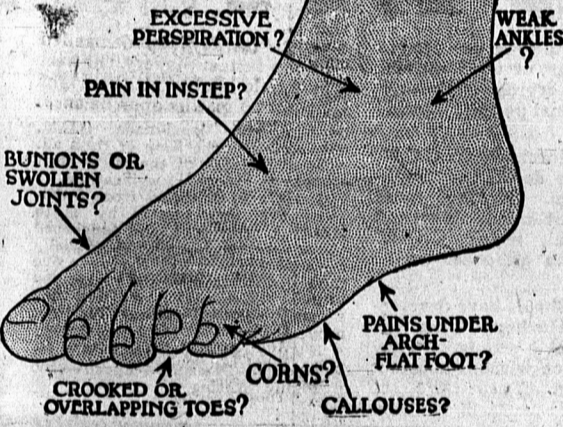

LONDON, Nov. 22.—Sir John Bennett, newly appointed high commissioner for Newfoundland, has been placed in an embarrassing position by the cables stating the new Government of Newfoundland has decided to cancel his appointment among others; and also reporting an intention to

abolish the office entirely. The Overseas League has arranged a luncheon for Friday night to welcome Sir John to Britain (he arrived only a fortnight ago), and Frederick Alderdice, a former Premier of Newfoundland, is to be the chairman. The arrangements for the moment are being adhered to. The Newfoundland High Commissioner's office, however, has called to St. John for precise information.
