SATISFACTORY RESULTS

The Ch'Town Engineers Attend in a body — A Large Crowd Expected Today.

The Bazaar in aid of the New Roman Catholic Cathedral opened yesterday afternoon in the basement of the building, at 4 o'clock, quite a large number attending.

The walls and ceilings are artistically decorated with flags, bunting and spruce, which tends to brighten and beautify the scene.

At 7.30 the crowds commenced to pour in through the main entrance on Sydney Street. A large arch is erected at this entrance and an arc light, arranged so as to throw its rays on the entrance and exit doors, making the place as bright as daylight.

On entering the main door one is surprised at the scene. Around the walls on both sides are arranged the refreshment tables, ice cream booth and oyster tables, all of which received the liberal patronage of those present.

On the end just at the entrance is the art table on which is displayed various articles including college and club colors, oil paintings, fancy frames, etc., are also displayed artistically in this booth.

Walking along a little further you come to the principal ice cream booth, which was also liberally patronized during the evening.

Next is a platform on which are arranged sewing machines, stoves, clocks etc., which are for lottery.

At the far end is a beautifully decorated booth—attended by equally as pretty maidens—which contains the home-made candy. This also received quite a call especially from the young men.

On one of the variety tables an electric battery created a fund of amusement but not for the victim who had the poles of the battery in his hands.

One feature of the big bazaar was the scarcity of lottery books. Of course there were articles to be lotteried and there were lottery books, but they were in the hands of young ladies who knew how to handle them.

Major Weeks, with a squad of about 60 Engineers, marched down for tea after their inspection. The Major is very popular among the boys, and the example set by him was well received by his company.

The League of the Cross band furnished the music for the evening, and it is needless to say everyone was pleased with the playing. About 10.30 the large crowd commenced to dwindle down and when the boys played God save the Queen at 10.45 the fun was over for the first evening.

To day the arrangements are about the same, and no doubt the trains will bring in large crowds. We did not hear what the proceeds were but judging from the crowds they must have realized quite a large amount.
