Flt. Sgt. Butler is a son of Sgt. William Butler and Mrs. Butler of York Point. His father a member of the staff at No. 62 C.A.B.T.C. at Beach Grove, is a veteran of the first great war. With his wife he came to Canada just after the end of the earlier conflict and took up land at York Point.

Several other members of the family are serving with the Canadian Armed Forces but their names were not learned last night.

Allied Planes Crash in Spain

LA LINEA, Spain, June 10 (AP) — Three Allied transport military planes crashed on the southern coast of Spain yesterday, causing the death of eight persons and leaving 14 injured.

A British plane made a forced landing at San Jose near Tarifa. Two of the eight occupants were injured.

United States transport plane made a crash landing at Punta Vega, about five miles from Tarifa, killing two persons and injuring four.

Another United States four-engine plane crashed near Algeciras killing six and injuring four.

An Axis report from Algeciras yesterday said one flying fortress was shot down near Tarifa, killing eight of the crew, after losing its bearings in a fog.

Post Office Warns Re Parcels For Overseas

OTTAWA, June 10 (CP) — The Post Office Department said today in a statement that Canadian civilians who address dutiable goods and parcels exceeding five pounds in weight to members of the forces overseas with the object of having them passed on to civilians there are "committing unpatriotic and foolish acts."

"Warnings has already been given," said the post office, "that any such contravention of the privileges extended by the British administration is likely to result in modification or withdrawal of benefits now enjoyed by the Canadian armed services over there."

"No loyal Canadian would knowingly jeopardize the special privilege of gift parcels to the armed forces."

LONDON, June 10 (CP Cable) — Flying Officer George Beurling of Verdun, Que., escaped injury when forced to bail out of a flaming Spitfire during a practice flight it was announced today.

U.S. Air Force Nearing Parity With R.A.F.

LONDON, June 10 (AP) — The strength of the United States Air Force, which is rapidly approaching parity with the R.A.F. in Britain, will be used to hit the enemy in three, four, five or more places in a single day with bombing fleets capable of obliterating any normal industrial target, Maj.-Gen. Ira C. Eaker said today.

Report Gen. De Gaulle Threatening To Resign

ALGIERS, June 10 (AP) — Sources close to Gen. Charles De Gaulle, of the fighting French committee, asserted tonight that he was threatening to resign from the newly-created French committee for national liberation unless he wins his point in the dismissal of former servants of Vichy.

At the same time, De Gaulle adherents said he was opposing the desire of Gen. Henri Giraud to assume the post of Minister of National Defence while retaining his position as commander-in-chief of the French army.

War Situation Last Night

Australia's Prime Minister is confident now that the invasion threat which has bedeviled the outlook of his country for 18 months has passed and that it is Japan that is on the defensive.

Mr. Curtin is not the first United Nations leader to assert that Japan's offensive power had been blunted. But perhaps his word is the most convincing of all since it is he who has spoken most frequently and emphatically of the dangers that persisted for the entire alliance, and especially Australia, as long as Japan held the initiative.

Germans Smash Towards Rostov

Russians Report Enemy Gains Are Wiped Out Later.

LONDON, June 10 (CP) — Thousands of Germans, supported by tanks and planes, cracked advance Russian lines today in a sudden lunge toward the Caucasian gateway of Rostov, but a Red Army counter-blow restored the situation, Moscow announced tonight.

The Germans used a full regiment, from 3,000 to 5,000 men, in this attack which temporarily overran Soviet out post detachments. But the midnight communiqué recorded by the Soviet Radio Monitor said "they were later thrown back by a Red army counter-blow and lost 300 men, the tanks and two planes."

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Missing Airman Presumed Dead

The name of an airman from St. Mary's Road, that of LAC Charles Michael McCarron, was listed last night as previously reported missing on active service, now for official purposes presumed dead. His name was on the 598th casualty list issued by the R.C.A.F. at Ottawa.

Need Cruisers, Subs To Round Out Navy

OTTAWA, June 10 (CP) — Navy Minister Macdonald said in the House of Commons today that in the establishment of the Canadian Navy after the war there should be cruisers as well as destroyers, with submarines to round out the organization.

But in the present war even if Canada had a strong fleet of submarines there would be little for them to do unless they were sent to distant theatres of war such as the Mediterranean or the South-west Pacific.

Butter Stocks Up; No Change In Present Ration

OTTAWA, June 10 (CP) — The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today that butter stocks in Canada June 1 were 4,500,000 pounds higher than the average for the same date in the previous five years, but the Prices Board promptly spiked any suggestion this condition warrants an increase in the ration of half a pound a person a week.

Claims Many Potatoes In North Sask.

OTTAWA, June 10 (CP) — Hundreds of carloads of potatoes are available in North Saskatchewan and can be bought at a cent a pound, according to a statement by the Saskatchewan Potato Growers' Association (Prog. Con Saskatchewan) said today in the Senate, and he urged that the shortage in Central Canada be relieved from that source.

Quotes New Figures Re Nazi Airmen

MONTREAL, June 10 (CP) — Hilary A. St. George Saunders, assistant librarian of the British House of Commons and Britain's official war historian, pulled a notebook from his pocket today and cited to interviewers figures to back up his contention that the Nazi air force no longer is capable of seriously damaging British industry.

"I have to read these figures or else I'm sure to get them wrong," joked Mr. Saunders, who is the author of Combined Operations, the Battle of Britain and other British government publications on the war. "I don't believe they have been published as yet."

Mr. Saunders said the figures, for the six-months period ended last April, show that of every raiding party sent against the British Isles by the Nazis, 12.9 per cent was destroyed.

Medical Assn. Drops Convention

MONTREAL, June 10 (CP) — The Canadian Medical Association announced today that because of travel restrictions it will hold only a business meeting this year attended by less than 100 representatives instead of the usual convention attended by 2,000 doctors.

At the meeting, starting here Saturday, Dr. D. Sclater Lewis, Montreal physician, will be installed president.

Stops Code Messages By Axis Members

BUENOS AIRES, June 10 (AP) — The Argentine Government today cancelled facilities which have permitted Axis Embassies and Nationals to transmit code messages to their capitals.

Body Of Airman Recovered From Waters Of Gulf

The body of a member of the Royal Air Force was recovered from the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence off Sea View on Wednesday and identified as that of a crew member of a plane missing from the Summerside airport since January 5. Of the men aboard the plane, one was a member of the R.C.A.F. and the others of the R.A.F.

The body was discovered by fishermen. Authorities were notified and Royal Canadian Mounted Police and Coroner Dr. J. D. MacGowan of Charlottetown went to the scene. Dr. MacGowan decided an inquest was not necessary.

Last night the body was resting at the MacLean Funeral Home in Charlottetown. Funeral arrangements were not completed but it was expected that burial, with full air force honors, would take place Saturday. The man was a sergeant navigator.

Sees Ministry As Essential War Service

HAMILTON, Ont., June 10 (CP) — Rev. C. L. Cowan of Hamilton today told the 60th general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada that the ministry must be considered as an essential war service. Speaking at the closing session of the assembly, Mr. Cowan contended that if this was not done, and if the war continued a few more years, there would be few if any men studying for the church.

"Behind the lines there is spiritual hunger, there is heartbreak, there is loneliness, there is strain," he continued. "If there is a breakdown in how long could it be would our fighting forces carry on? It is no secret that Germany lost the last war because of loss of moral fibre on the home front."

Presenting a report of the committee on church worship, Mr. Cowan urged that scarcity of ministers be combated by organization of a Lay Readers' Association of Elders, Sunday School Superintendents, and other workers who can preach or read a sermon or a service.
