WOMEN DEMAND HOME GROWN 'CANNED VEGETABLES'

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 22. (By the Canadian Press)—In connection with the canning of fruit being done at Spadina House, by city women, it is planned, when the finished product is returned, to have on rows of shelves all the canned fruit and vegetables nicely classified. When the Welfare Department desires so many jars of jam or pickles, etc., they can be swiftly checked out, each kind placed together so that no unnecessary delay will occur.

"Best news we've heard in a long time," was the greeting this news received from Mrs. K. G. MacKinnon of the Visiting Housekeepers. "Vegetables and fruit are the very things that are lacking in the families to which our housekeepers go. We don't always expect the city to supply them, and the result is that our families too often have a monotonous diet. It's a wonderful idea this, of storing our over-abundant crops, and I know just what it is going to mean for our families, and especially for our mothers and children."

Mrs. Irving Robertson, of the Mothercraft Centre, welcomed the word that a preserving centre, is under way with open arms. She delights in it because mothercraft work, with its endeavors to stimulate and keep up the milk flow with nursing mothers, depends so greatly on green foods and fruits and vegetables of all sorts. Miss Margaret Gould of the Child Welfare Council was more than delighted that the step had been taken. "It will mean such a great thing for our children," she said. "It seems wonderful that the idea of salvaging things has been put so quickly into action."

"Though we make it a practice never to give aid either in food or in clothing—ours is a nursing service entirely—I, and the nurses who so often meet cases of malnutrition in their rounds, will be thankful to know that fruits and vegetables are to be conserved for the needy," said Miss Edith Campbell of the Victorian Order. "So often our nurses find cases that would be greatly helped if only there were a few fruits and vegetable vitamins in the diet. They'll be delighted to know that our various food distributing agencies will have a supply to draw upon."

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 23.—There were 129 cattle, 79 calves, 353 hogs and 322 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today, including about 40 cattle held over from Monday's and Tuesday's markets. A total of 453 cattle were received for export to Great Britain leaving this week, on the Manchester Regiment and the Airthria. Calves were about steady. Just fair quality calves in mixed lots sold for \$7 and up to \$7.50 for those of better quality. Good ewes and wethers were steady at \$8, with culls and bucks picked out at \$4. Sheep brought around \$2 and \$2.50.

OILING THE ISLAND FERRY

(Canadian Press)

F. R. Sayer, writing of the new car ferry in the current issue of the Railway Magazine, says of the ferry's fuel:

The Charlottetown is 5,589 tons gross registry, is 324 feet long and 59 feet in width, with a depth of 25 feet. She is an oil-burner and carries 470 tons of oil in her tanks, sufficient to last about two weeks. Two large oil storage tanks have been erected at Borden and special facilities have been installed in the way of pumps, and other equipment to handle the oil fuel. To fuel all that is necessary is for the flexible connection at the dock to be connected with the coupling on the deck of the car ferry and oil is then pumped into the tanks at the rate of 629 gallons per minute. As the ferry has to operate under winter conditions, special facilities have been provided in connection with the oil delivery supply to prevent any breakdown. The pumps are in duplicate and steam heat is passed to the oil at various places to keep it fluid. Two tanks, sufficient to hold three times the pipe line capacity are installed at the end of the pipe line and after every filling the oil is blown into these tanks which are heated by steam. When it is necessary to refuel, the tanks are emptied first and then the oil is taken from the pipe line. Oil-fired boilers in the power house furnish steam for the pumps and also for the engines which work the transfer aprons for railway cars and automobiles.
