PARIS, Dec. 1.—France's costly merchant marine is to be disposed of soon at a deficit of one billion francs.

REVIEW OF FOX SHOW HELD AT TORONTO

Summerside Carries the Majority of Prizes, Winning Four Out of Five Trophies. Wonderful Showing of Pure Canadian Fox Company. Island Wins Practically All Prizes.

The Royal Fair at Toronto has never in its history but probably has a more successful show than any other. Visitors from Great Britain, United States and other countries say that the display of live stock was of a higher class than at any previous show in any country.

The holding of a fox show in connection with the fair was a new departure but has probably established itself as a permanent fixture. Owing to the crowding of the buildings the foxes had to be accommodated under the Grand Stand, which was not as pleasant quarters as could be desired, but that the advantage of being in a prominent situation to attract the notice of visitors who came in the eastern entrance.

Upwards of four hundred foxes were exhibited and the show was made an international one, which was the intention of the management, by the presence of an American exhibitor, Mr. Cole Remsen, New York, who it is pleasing to say, was a prize winner.

Big Island Exhibit.

The principal exhibitors of course were from Prince Edward Island, nearly two hundred foxes coming from the home of the industry. It is true that many of the best ranches on Prince Edward Island were not represented, owing largely to the fact that the exhibition took up a large amount of time and was at a distance from the province.

Foxes Took It Calmly

The foxes did not seem to mind the attention they got from the public. They were encased in steel cages with galvanized iron bottoms and they felt perfectly safe.

Every fox cage was sprayed with disinfectants once or twice during the day, the health arrangements being under the care of Dr. J. A. Allen and his assistant Mr. Fred Burke. Dr. Allen also examined all foxes which appeared for show purposes and carried out his work in a thoroughly satisfactory manner.

The judges of the show were Mr. P. J. Drolet, manager of the firm of A. & E. Pierce Co. Limited, Montreal, and Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, Charlottetown. Mr. Drolet is a man of excellent worth having had a life long training in the raw fur business. He was most careful in making the final awards.
