Team Likely About Same As Year Ago
CAMPBELLTON, Oct. 22.—According to inquiries addressed to a member of the Campbellton Hockey team today the New Brunswick and P. E. I. champions will enter the fray again this winter. No definite steps have yet been taken by the last year officials of the local hockey club, but a preliminary move toward reorganization is expected within the next week.

A survey of the situation here discloses the encouraging fact that the Campbellton team will likely enter the league with the same lineup as last season, with the possible exception of Wm. Colombe, the promising French Canadian sub. The mainstays of the team are all here, however. Howard Wilkins and Thomas will doubtless appear on the forward line again this winter. Perce Mackenzie will likely take his former position in the net, and McLean and Sharpe will in all probability guard the home territory with the assistance of Walter Ferguson, who returned home from the west on Saturday.

Joe Laviolette will likely be on the lineup again this season to strengthen the team's defensive work with his famous poke check.

In addition to the regulars there will also be one or two promising younger hockeyists ready to fill any possible vacancy. Moreover Miller will likely be home for many of the most important contests on the league schedule. As yet there is no coach in sight, the removal of the Rev. W. S. Godfrey to Westville, N. S., depriving the squad of the ablest coach the team ever had, and the vacancy will be a difficult one to fill.

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
