KING PLAYS ACTIVE PART IN THE BUSINESS OF WAR

His Majesty Particularly Solicitous For The Welfare and Comfort of The Fighting Forces; Day's Work Begins at Six o'clock Every Morning.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The part which King George is playing in the war is following activity, and a mastery of details such as might alarm even a great financier, comprise the present daily routine of the King. Often, soon after six in the morning, the King is busy in his study, and by the time his advisers and helpers appear he has combed the despatches and documents of the early delivery, mastered their contents and perhaps made numbers of marginal notes in readiness for the forthcoming conference.

"The very sight of the contents of the numerous despatches would intimidate most men. Admiralty, War Office, Home Office and India Office—all contribute their daily quantum while from the Government comes a tremendous amount of pressing business which cannot be settled without the King's sanction; but, happily, controversial matters have fallen into oblivion, and there are no difficulties of this sort to contend with.

KING'S PASSION FOR DETAIL.

"The problem continually arising regarding the war are many and great, but nothing is too intricate for the King, who insists on going into everything and seeing that the needs of the services are grappled with by the business heads of the various departments. The number, qualification, equipment and location of the food, clothes and the little extras that go to the maintenance of their health and spirits. The slightest hint regarding any special article of apparel is accepted, and his Majesty's invariably reply, when anything outside the scope of the Admiralty War Office, is named, is: 'I will tell the Queen!'"

CANADA ORDER FORTY ARMORED MOTOR CARS.

TORONTO, Nov. 28.—Armoured motor cars of a standard of efficiency that are said to be second to none in the world are now to be manufactured by the Russell Motor Car Company for the Dominion Government. After inspecting a model to-day, Major-General Hughes confirmed an order for forty cars.

This order is made up of twenty cars to equip a motor machine gun battery, and in addition twenty cars to be ordered by the Government.

TO DESTROY ZEPPELINS.

PARIS, Nov. 28.—According to the Eclair, a Grenoble jeweller, Anthony Jacques, has invented an arrow bomb for destroying Zeppelins, which it quite harmless when it strikes a hard surface, even with great force, although it can be set to act as a percussion bomb if desired. Experiments made yesterday morning at Grenoble, before a party of investigators, including M. Morad, the local fire chief, showed that when the arrow bomb struck a comparatively flimsy fabric, like the envelope of a dirigible, it promptly exploded, but when thrown violently against a steel plate fell harmlessly to the ground. The inventor says these bombs could be cheaply and rapidly fabricated, and suggests that they might be thrown from aeroplanes in handfins. He placed his invention at the disposal of the War Department.

APPEAL FOR STARVING PEOPLE IN BELGIUM.

NEW YORK, November 28.—"This Thanksgiving Day found seven million starving persons in war-swept Belgium crying out for bread and only half enough food on hand to appease their hunger. Three thousand tons of food are required each day to feed the sufferers, yet to date the United States, upon which the Belgians most depend in the main for sustenance, has furnished less than half that amount. Ten ounces a day will save a human being from death by hunger."

The foregoing epitomises a statement today by the American commission for the relief of Belgium, carrying a plea for the small quantity of food specified for each inhabitant of the stricken land.

A cable from H. C. Hoover, chairman of the London committee, declared the situation desperate, and urged assistance immediately. He said the commission was chartering several ships for despatch to the Atlantic seaboard, trusting that Americans would fill them with supplies.

The Middle States are leading in contributions, the commission says. President Edmund James, of the University of Illinois, has started a movement to raise \$500,000. Each of the ninety-nine counties in Iowa soon will contribute a second car load of flour. Kentucky is giving freely, an example of its charity being shown the other day when J. S. Ellington, a blind and armless soldier, 82 years of age, of Narfield, contributed fifty cents. And in Kansas, ten thousand active workers have been organized for the cause in just ten days.

AUSTRALIA SENDS 19,000 MORE FOR FRONT.

LONDON, November 28.—While Petrograd correspondents continue to declare that the Russians have won a great victory over the Germans in Poland, official confirmation of their statements is still lacking. Altho the Russian headquarters says the advantage in the fighting still lies with their troops, Berlin, on the other hand, declares that no decisive battle has been fought. Some of the German newspapers claim a success for their armies.

The silence of Grand Duke Nicholas, the Russian commander-in-chief in the east, as to the progress of the battle in Poland, is causing some unfavorable comment in Russia. Advice received from Petrograd says there is a feeling there that perhaps the claims of the newspapers of a Russian success have been exaggerated.

In the western war zone, comparative quiet prevails. No reports of heavy fighting have been recorded here in several days, although there have been intermittent artillery duels, and at various places small infantry encounters.

Snow has interfered with the fighting in Serbia, where the Austrians are making a supreme effort to rid themselves of their difficulties.

The Roumanian parliament will meet tomorrow, and the future course of action of this kingdom probably will be decided. It is said that Roumania is prepared to cede to Bulgaria some of the territory which she secured after the second Balkan war at the expense of her neighbor. This may mean that Bulgaria is about to take her stand by the side of the allies, and in return be permitted to straighten out her boundaries and take more to the country inhabited by her nationals.

In addition to a contingent of 21,000 men who are already in England it is announced that Austria has raised a second contingent of 19,000 men.

ATTEMPT BY GERMAN TO POISON SOLDIERS IN LONDON, ONT., CAMP?

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 28.—Discovery of bottles labelled poison in the camp of the Eighteenth Second Contingent Battalion here, and further arrests by the military police, are sensational developments that follow as the sequel to the arrest of a German, calling himself a commercial traveller, in the city last night by military police. Colonel Wigle, commanding officer of the 18th Battalion, absolutely refuses to say a word concerning either the arrest or the poison.

THE PLATOON SYSTEM HAS BEEN DISCARDED.

SALISBURY PLAINS, November 28.—The platoon system has been discarded and the Canadians have returned to the old double company formation, which worked well in Canada, on the advice of the war office. This means that many hours spent in training troops are practising lately have been wasted.

The reversion is the result of experience on the firing line in France. The platoon system is used by the French and Germans and was adopted by the imperial army. It is now found that huge companies of 250 men unweilded. Scores of officers who were left without a place under the platoon formation have been reinstated. Colonel Victor Williams has gone to France, following other officers who have visited the front for a few days' experience of real warfare.

FAMINE WILL END EUROPEAN WAR.

ALBANY, New York, Nov. 28.—Famine will end the European war, and the feeding of starving millions will take precedence over the re-arrangement of political lines, according to David Starr Jordan, peace advocate, today.

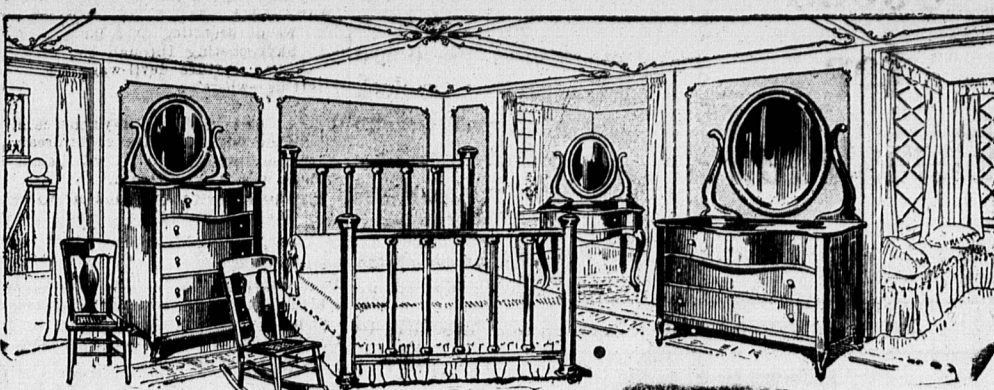
"Starved people will demand peace," said Dr. Jordan. "Hunger will stalk everywhere through battle wrecked lands. Mad appetite will scream aloud for satisfaction. The which did not bog the strife will halt the strife."

"The voice of the people" will stop the conflict. One year will bring signs indicative of these things. Dr. Jordan declared that absolute bankruptcy will face every one of the warring nations excepting Great Britain.

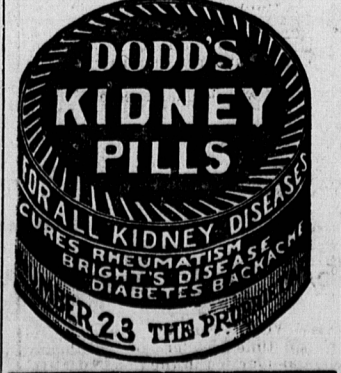
An effort is to be made to recruit in this Province one Squadron at war strength (149 of all ranks) for overseas service with the 2nd. Contingent.
