THERE will be prayer meeting in the Baptist church this evening at 8 o'clock.

HUGH J. MACLEOD, of Badalbane, has left Prince of Wales College, and entered the service of the Bank of New Brunswick.

LESLIE AND Mrs. McLEOD who have been visiting on the Island during the winter, leave this week on return to Arcola, Sask.

SEVEN boats left Cape Traverser for the mainland, yesterday at 8.30 with 88 bags of mail and 13 passengers. Seven boats arrived from Tormentine at 11.45 with 21 bags of mail and one passenger. The crossing was very good.

To night "The Daughter of Erin" will be presented in the Opera House. This is an excellent play in five acts, with specialties, interesting from start to finish. Join the crowd to the Opera to-night and enjoy a good entertainment.

A public meeting was held in Elliott Hall on the 18th inst, to discuss the ferry service from Rocky Point to Charlottetown. Owen King was chairman, and A. S. McNeill, secretary. The hall, which is a large one, was packed to the doors, indicating pretty well the interest taken in the matter by the people of that section. The following spoke of the high fares charged in the boat between Rocky Point and the City: Richard Griffin, South Shore; M. McKinnon, Rocky Point; Douglas Currie, West River; James Hogan, South Shore. They contended that the same fares were paid now as forty years ago while the people at Southport have a free bridge to come over on. There are times at Rocky Point, between the opening and closing of navigation when for two or three weeks there is no means of communication with Charlottetown, and that for a return trip the fare is 25 cents. There are farmers on that side of the river who pay yearly from \$10 to \$35 for freight. It was unanimously agreed that a delegation be appointed to wait upon the Government, now in session to state the grievance of the meeting.

On the 18th inst, Kinkora held its first St. Patrick's celebration, and the result was a grand and decided success, reflecting much credit on the pastor, Rev. J. J. McDonald, the members of the C. M. B. A. and the Irish people of Kinkora. The special trains from Cape Traverser and Emerald were crowded and at 8 p.m. a thoroughly appreciative and attentive audience of about 600 people were ready to greet the "Grand River West Drama Club," who, with their moderator and director, Rev. J. A. McDonald were there to present the thrilling drama "Kathleen Mavourneen." At the commencement of the play, and between the acts an excellent program was presented consisting principally of an eloquent address on "The Day we Celebrate," by Rev. Dr. Monaghan, Missions, selections on the violin, readings by Mr. Crocove, Wellington; readings by D. Stewart, Glenfennan; instrumental and vocal music by Mrs. J. A. McNeil, Rev. J. J. McDonald, Rev. Dr. Monaghan; Dialogue, by Dr. Donahoe, and Miss Annie Smith, &c. But the important part of the program was the capital rendition of the drama "Kathleen Mavourneen." The Grand River Dramatic Club deserves all the praise that can be bestowed upon them, considering that this, their first performance was such a decided success. Miss Iris Cole as the heroine "Kathleen" won alternately the applause and sympathy of the audience. She interpreted a heavy and difficult part most naturally and with great credit to herself. The other ladies taking part were Miss McGrath, "The Squire's Sister," who took her part with dignity and enjoyed her "tea" immensely; Miss McNeill as "Kitty" who showed herself an adept housemaid and furniture-maker; and Miss Cameron, who in the witch's role showed that she could dance as well. The male characters in the play were also well impersonated. Frank McDonald, as Terence O'Moore, was the hero of the play, ably supporting Kathleen in her joys and sorrows, and his acting and singing were greatly appreciated. Willis Williams took his part well as Squire Kavanagh, and was ably assisted in his "rascally" plotting, by Louis McDonald, Frank McLean and Joseph Cameron; the last named also playing creditably the role of Kathleen's father. The humorist of the play was P. B. McNeill, who created much merriment. The other parts were cleverly taken by A. McDonald, in the role of Father A. Cassidy; Chas. Morrison, Dan Morrison, and Nell McKinnon. The entire play was well rendered and the thanks tendered at the close by the pastor to Rev. J. A. McDonald and the troupe were richly merited. God Save the King brought the entertainment to an end.

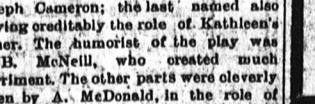
