MR. TERENCE GOODWIN.

The residents of Emerald received a sad shock on Friday evening last, when a telegram from Winnipeg announced the sudden death that morning of Mr. Terrence Goodwin. Mr. Goodwin who was always held in high esteem as a citizen of Emerald, removed with his family to Winnipeg last fall, and was enjoying good health until the time of his death, which was due to heart failure, while at work about 10:30 a. m. His many friends in this province will greatly regret to learn of his death, as he was highly respected as a peaceable, honest, conscientious citizen, and a master mechanic, having followed the carriage working business during the past thirty-eight years in Emerald. His burial took place in Winnipeg, where all his family reside, his wife having pre-deceased him several years ago. The sympathy of many friends here goes out to his family in that city.

Smallwood, one of East Royalty's oldest and most respected citizens passed peacefully away, at the residence of her son, Francis Smallwood on the 13th inst. after an illness of about two weeks at the age of 84 years. The deceased was born in Charlottetown but the greater part of her life was spent in Mt. Herbert, where her kind and loving disposition won for her many friends. Her husband predeceased her five years ago. A large number of friends followed the remains to their last resting place, which showed the respect in which she was held by her neighbors and the community at large. She leaves to mourn three sons, Herbert in Winnipeg, Henry in Bunbury and Francis of East Royalty, also two sisters, Mrs. Mutch of Charlottetown and Mrs. MacDonald of Calgary and one brother, George Rattary, of Mill Cove to all of whom deepest sympathy is extended. The remains were laid to rest beside her husband and two children in Mt. Herbert Cemetery. The Rev. 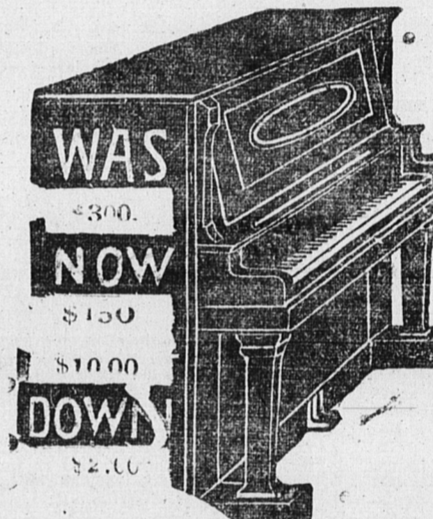

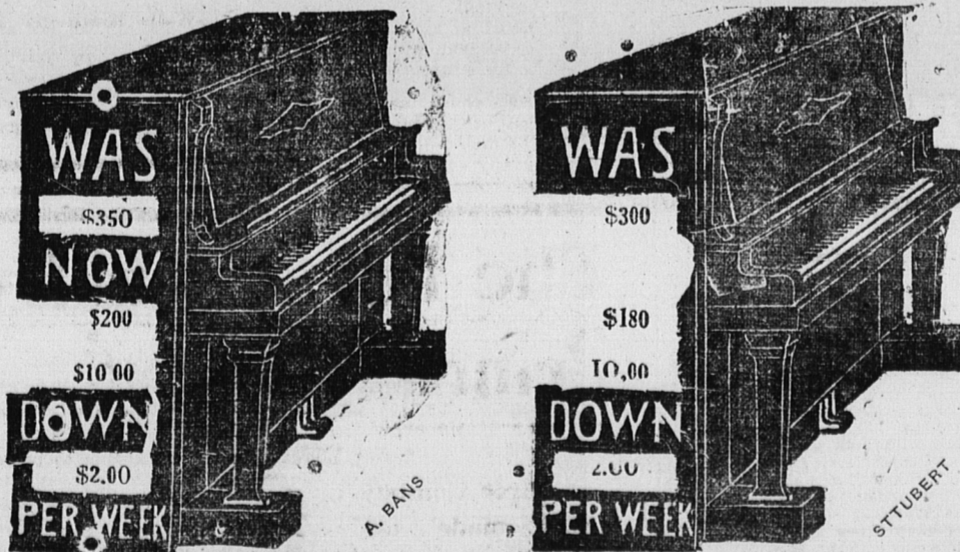
