Toe Blake Sees 20-goal Circle Increasingly Difficult As Hockey Season Opens

MONTREAL, Nov. 10 (CP)—Hector (Toe) Blake pushed a shin-pat into place, slowly pulled up a stocking over it, and then expressed the opinion today that it is becoming increasingly difficult with each new National Hockey League season for the boys to hit that 20-goal or better circle.

The Montreal Canadiens star did it last season for the first time when he won the N. H. L. scoring title with 24 goals and 23 assists. But only four other players in the league were able to tally 20 goals or more, and Blake admits that it is "going to be plenty tough to hit the mark this year."

Blake suggests that "the main stumbling-block to the boys hitting the mark now is the fact that each club has gone out of its way in the past few years to build up three good forward lines." It simply means less play and less goals, according to the man chosen for the left wing post on last season's Canadian Press all-star team.

Tommy Farr Scores Knockout

DUBLIN, Nov. 10 (CP Cable)—Tommy Farr, Welsh heavyweight, scored a third round knockout over Manuel Abrew of Glasgow in a scheduled 10-round bout here tonight. Abrew, a colored fighter, weighed 183 and Farr 196.

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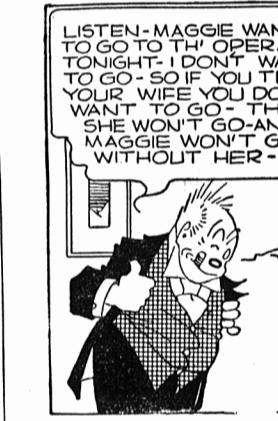
Two Famous Rugby Clubs Clash Today
