## TWO CLASSES OF THE DOUKHOBORS

### Some Facts Given By a Man Who Knows a Good Deal

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 28.—The Rev. John McDougall, D.D., of Calgary, one of the best known pioneers in the west, and now government commissioner of Doukhobor Lands, is a visitor in the city. Dr. McDougall has just returned from a visit to the Doukhobor colony near Prince Albert, and has been inquiring into conditions and finding out particulars of desired changes in land holdings. While visiting these colonies he lived in the houses of the people and so came into intimate touch with them.

"There are two classes among the Doukhobors," said Dr. McDougall, this morning, "those who wish to consolidate the community and those who wish to become independent. The latter class is increasing in numbers and is also more numerous. These are the best advocates of our types of civilization and are showing to the other people that better progress can be made by standing alone. The other people are more dependent upon the heads of the community and thus do not put forth the same energy.

"The government, as is known, set aside about sixty reserves for these people, but now many of them wish to hold their land independently. Our report has to be made to the government yet, but I believe that something will be done towards allowing them to do this. The number desiring to change is quite large and is constantly increasing. All the Doukhobors, both in the community and those living independently, repudiate the fanatics who make pilgrimages and otherwise act in a way to bring discredit upon them. We were treated very kindly by these people and found them in good circumstances. There will be no danger of any hardship among them this winter."

## EARL OF MINTO'S BROKEN NECK

Not Generally Known Viceroy of India Has Survived Broken Neck.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Very few people know that the Earl of Minto, Viceroy of India, is the only man who ever survived a broken neck. In his younger days the earl was one of the most daring and ardent of sportsmen, and he severely had a rival in riding, rowing, shooting and fishing. His lordship's great passion, however, was for horse riding, and it is related how he took his degree in a riding costume covered by an academic gown. Immediately after the ceremony he leaped into his saddle and galloped off to the race course, arriving in time to win the "Varsity Steeplechase." In 1876 the earl rode Zero in the race for the Grand National, and it was then that he nearly met his death. Zero fell at one of the fences, and every one thought that the rider had been instantly killed with a broken neck. Sir James Paget was summoned, and even to the doctor's astonishment his lordship recovered, the doctor declaring that in the whole of his experience it was the only instance he knew of the vertebra going into its place after being stretched.
