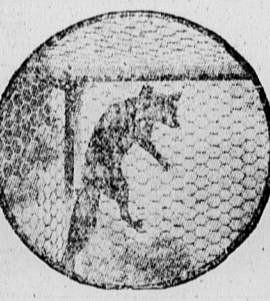

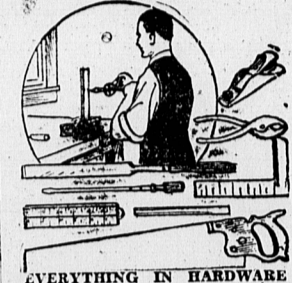

BRINGING UP FATHER



Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have completed and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL

With the exception of south and central Saskatchewan and south-eastern Alberta, moisture is ample to carry crops to maturity. Should present favourable conditions continue, cutting will be general in ten to fifteen days, and indications point to an average yield. Some damage from rust is reported in Manitoba. In Quebec Province the weather continues favourable for all crops. In Ontario, while crops are for the most part considered promising, rain is needed in some areas. In the Maritime Provinces favourable weather prevails and crops generally are progressing satisfactorily. In British Columbia the weather continues hot and dry, and rain would be welcome in most districts.

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

Alberta Northeastern Area—Warm weather and scattered showers have helped crops, which are now all headed. Some districts have suffered severely from hail. Alberta Southeastern Area—Cutting should commence next week. The average wheat yield is estimated at not more than ten bushels, as about 35% of the acreage seeded has been abandoned. Alberta Western Area—Wheat is headed out and, following ample moisture is filling out rapidly. An average crop is expected. The sugar beet crop is very satisfactory. Saskatchewan Northern Area—Crop prospects continue favourable for a good average yield. Hail damage has been heavy in several localities. Harvesting will be general in ten to fifteen days. Saskatchewan Southern Area—Crops are maturing rapidly. Fair yields are expected from Summer-fallow, but stubble crops over a substantial area have been badly burned out in the south central portion many farmers face almost total crop failure. Harvesting will be general in ten days. Manitoba—Wheat is ripening rapidly and cutting should be general in ten days. Damage from rust has been reported at most points, and is expected to affect late crops. All coarse grains are making good progress.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Spring wheat has a good appearance and is progressing rapidly. An average crop of barley is indicated and harvesting is about to commence. Oats generally are above average. The harvesting of a heavy crop of hay of good quality is well advanced. Peas and corn are making good progress. Roots continue to show improvement. Grass pastures are in excellent condition.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Harvesting of fall wheat is general and, where threshed, average yields of good quality are reported. The cutting of barley has commenced and a good crop is expected. Oats are ripening rapidly; continued dry weather will lessen the yield. Corn, root crops and pasturage in some districts require more moisture. Tobacco topping has commenced. Flue is reported as suffering from drought. Peaches and grapes promise a good crop.

MARITIME PROVINCES

An average hay crop is being harvested. Grains are making good progress and better average results are anticipated. Potatoes and other roots are doing well.

PROV. OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Grain crops are doing well. The hay crop has been harvested in good condition, but is somewhat below average. Estimated yield of apples is 90% and, generally speaking, the fruit is very clean. Apricots are being shipped, but the crop is practically a failure. Heavy crops of plums and prunes are expected. Tomatoes have come on well during the last two weeks and semi-ripe tomatoes are being shipped. Raspberries and loganberries are almost over. Crops are light in both cases, but the quality is good. Pasturage is suffering from the heat and rain is needed on the cattle ranges.

EX-CHIEF PETERS THOUGH BEATEN STILL CONTENT

Liberal Interference At Lennox Island Election Is Charged By Mr. Peters.

Interference by Liberal workers with the Indian vote in the election of a chieftain for the Micmac tribe in this Province, which took place last Wednesday at Lennox Island, was the complaint made to a Guardian reporter by Ex-Chief Isaac Peters, the defeated candidate, who attributes the election of his rival, Chief Jacob Sark, son of Ex-Chief John Sark, to political influences due to the fact that Mr. Peters had come out strongly in support of the Conservative party in the Dominion election last Monday.

The election of Chief Jacob Sark, Mr. Peters charges, was aided by white men, Liberal workers, who transported Indian voters to the single polling station at Lennox Island and encouraged them to support Mr. Sark's candidature. This interference was in direct violation of the prevailing custom, the Indians hitherto being allowed to settle their own electoral problems among themselves. For Rev. John A. MacDonald, Grand River, who presided at the election, Mr. Peters had nothing but the highest praise. "Father John", as he is affectionately called, has introduced many reforms in the voting system at Lennox Island and is one of the staunchest friends the Indians have in the Province.

Matters affecting the interests of his people were given by Ex-Chief Peters as the reason for his support of the Conservative party in the Dominion election last Monday. Formerly a Liberal worker, he was dissatisfied that certain grievances of the Indians respecting cheaper importation of ash for basket making were ignored in the Duncan Report and also with the manner in which Indian workers had been discriminated against by Liberal contractors. The fact that if he threw his influence against the Liberals in the Dominion election it would affect his own election as chieftain of the tribe was hinted to him by a prominent Liberal worker in Charlottetown; but this threat Mr. Peters ignored, and gave his whole support to the Conservative candidates. He interviewed Hon. R. B. Bennett on the occasion of the Conservative leaders' campaign visit here, and was greatly impressed with Mr. Bennett's sincerity and interest in the welfare of the Indians.

Ex-Chief Peters, who is a returned soldier, naturally has a strong following among returned men of his tribe. Every Indian who has served in the War has a vote in the Dominion elections; also every Indian living outside the reservations at Rocky Point, Lennox Island, Morell and Scotchfort. "I have lost my own election, but I have the satisfaction of knowing that I helped to elect the best men to the Canadian Parliament," Mr. Peters declared. "I would have done the same thing over again, because I believe I acted in the best interests of my people. We know now that we have strong friends at Ottawa in the new Prime Minister, and in Messrs. McLure and Myers, the Conservative representatives for Queen's County." The voting system at Lennox Is-

land has undergone considerable change in the last fifty years. It is now by secret ballot, as in provincial and federal elections. Adult male members of the Micmac tribe from all over the Island are entitled to vote.

Chieftains are elected for a period of three years. They appoint their own councillors and hold caucuses at occasional intervals. The position carries with it considerable honor and influence among the tribe.

Ex-Chief Peters, who was elected three years ago, is a sturdy specimen of the aboriginal inhabitants of Canada, and takes a keen interest in current events.

The new chief, Jacob Sark, is a splendid type of Indian and com- of a noted family. He is a former student of St. Dunstan's University, an experienced farmer and was a former teacher in the School at Lennox Island, the position now being occupied by his brother. He defeated Mr. Peters by a majority of twenty-four votes. The rivalry between the two candidates was conducted in a sportsmanlike manner, each entertaining a marked respect for the other's qualities.

PRINCESS PRAISES GIRLS OF ENGLAND

LONDON, Aug. 2.—"Your English girls, they are wonderfully pretty."

This was the farewell message given by Princess Takamatsu, the Japanese bride, who has been in London in an official visit with her husband, before she left for Paris. "Before I went to the last court at Buckingham Palace I had really not had any chance of seeing and studying English girls, except by glimpses caught from the windows of a car," she said. "At the court, however, I saw some of the prettiest and most delightful girls I have ever seen. Their dresses, too, were magnificent and charming. You could not wish for a more beautiful sight."

Another point that struck the princess was the great strain on the King and Queen of receiving so many people. "It must be very tiring, especially for the King," she said, "but he seemed to bear the strain without any undue fatigue at all."

GIRL'S DISAPPEARANCE ONCE MORE IS PROBED

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Investigation of the disappearance two years ago of Miss Frances St. John Smith, student at Smith College, was reopened today by New York police. Word was received at the missing persons' bureau that a young woman is being held in a hospital at Cincinnati, Ohio, on suspicion that she is the missing girl.
