Plans Fyled by Grand Trunk on which Subsidy Will be Claimed.

HAVANA, Dec. 26.—Frederick Brown, a circus performer of Buffalo (N. Y.), while attempting to make a balloon ascension here today, struck a projection of a building. He fell 100 feet to the ground and was killed.

PARTIES TO WITHDRAW

TOULON, France, December 24.—At the court today in the case of the "Count" and "Countess" D'Aulby de Diegeny, the attorneys for the Countess de Choiseul-Braslav, formerly Mrs. Charles Hamilton Paine, of Boston, announced that they withdrew the complaint and would retire from the case. The public prosecutor, however, insisted that the trial be continued.

AVIATORS HAD LUCK

LONDON, Dec. 26.—Acting on the instructions of his medical adviser, Claude Grahame White, who narrowly escaped serious injury a week ago, and whose aeroplane was burned Sunday, has decided to forego further attempts at flights across the English channel, in competing for the Baron DeForest prize of \$20,000 for distance.

ANOTHER BODY FOUND IN RUINS

MONTREAL, Dec. 26.—After being imbedded for over two months in the ruins of the King's hall, St. Catherine street, the body of a colored man named Willis, was discovered on Saturday afternoon by men engaged in clearing away the debris. The fire at King's hall occurred on October 13, and on the following day it was discovered that six persons had been burned to death. A seventh (Willis), who was a billiard marker, was missing, but no trace of him was found and it is not known whether he was killed or not. He had no friends and all efforts to recover his remains or make sure whether he had perished were abandoned shortly after the fire.

PLOT TO DETHRONE ALFONSO OF SPAIN

MADRID, December 26.—Discussion centers here in the sensational break between the Socialists and Republicans in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday. The Carlist leader Vasquez Mella Y. Candido, made an unexampled assault upon the government and Premier Canalejas, whom he charged with cognizance some years ago with a secret plot against Alfonso. A crowded chamber hung upon the Senor Mella's words. The purport of his charges was that Senor Canalejas, whom he called a renegade cleric, had been aware during the incumbency of former Prime Minister Morel of an agreement between that statesman and the Pope to bring about the removal of Alfonso from the Throne of Spain.

EUROPEANS MURDERED

BRISBANE, Australia Dec. 25.—Advice received here by steamer from Ponape, Caroline Islands, are to the effect that the natives in Ponape revolted recently and murdered four Europeans and five friendly natives.

JOHN D. DALY IS BILLIARD CHAMPION

NEW YORK, December 26.—John D. Daly is now the champion three cushion billiardist, he defeated Alfred De Oro in a three nights' match, played at Doyle's 42nd street billiard academy by a score of 150 to 120. De Oro had held the championship since last May. Had he held the title for one year the Lambert diamond medal would have become his property.

ANOTHER DOUBLE TRAGEDY

He then ordered Mrs. Boggs, a sick neighbor, to leave her bed and go out in the snow. Buckley threatened to kill any one who tried to arrest him or to minister to his wife. Patrolman Henry Shirres shot Buckley through the heart. Buckley's two little children were witnesses to the crime.

HERMAN WRIGHT TERRORIZED VILLAGE

WINDSOR, Ont., Dec. 21.—Herman Wright, aged 27, is on the rampage in Harrow, a small village near Windsor, armed with a repeating rifle and two revolvers. He demands \$5,000 in cash money for his release. The police force is paralyzed and have telegraphed to Windsor for assistance, in arresting young Wright.
