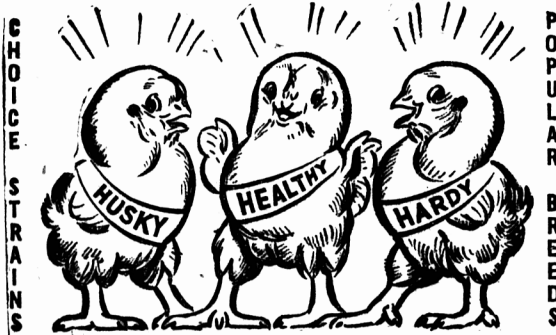

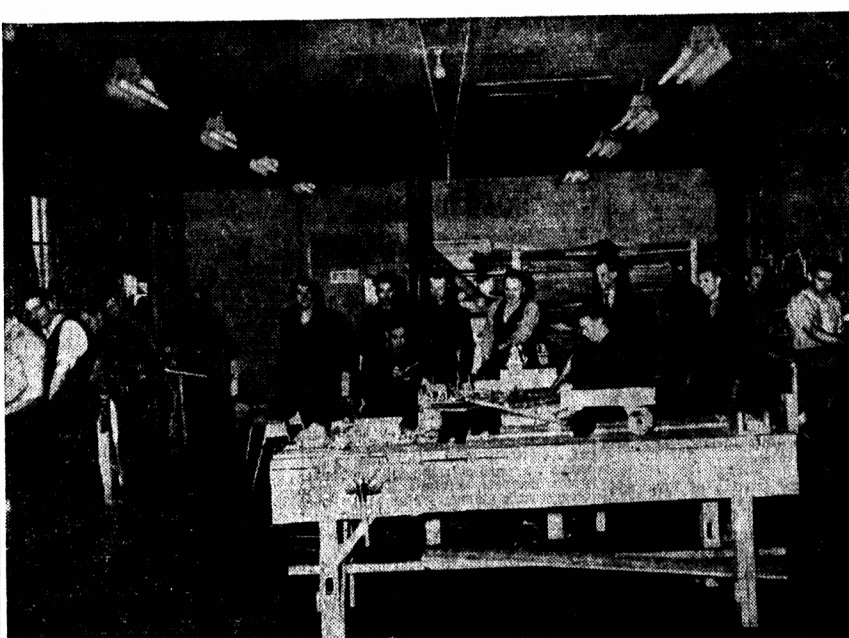

Veterans' Training—News And Views

particular structure will be a wing of a larger building devoted to combined academic and vocational education of high school boys and girls. The building is 131 feet long by 37 feet wide. It has three floors, with two large workshop areas on each floor, separated by a central corridor with stairways. In connection with each of the six workshop areas are office, tool room and stockroom spaces.

On the second floor will be the carpentry workshops and very likely this will occupy the whole floor since there are already twenty-one taking this course and many more waiting. On the top floor will be located the workshop group taking electricity, about which more will be said at a later date. From the number of men on the waiting list for all our shop work courses, there is no doubt that for the next year or two the whole of this large new workshop will be in use for the training of veterans.

Spy For Russia at Quebec Conference?

OTTAWA, March 6. (CP)—Possibility that secrets of the Quebec conference between Winston Churchill, former British prime minister and the late President Roosevelt reached the Russians through under cover agents was seen yesterday in the charge that a British Government employee here had served as a Soviet spy from Jan. 1, 1942, to Sept. 7, 1945.

The employee is Kathleen Mary Willsher, 40-year-old deputy registrar in the British High Commissioner's office who was charged yesterday in Ottawa police court as a result of the Royal Commission inquiry into the Soviet spy ring which operated in this Capital.

The charge said that Miss Willsher had secretly furnished all secret documents in the High Commissioner's office and that she communicated the contents of them to Russian representatives during the period Jan. 1, 1942, to Sept. 7, 1945.

That would cover the period in which the two conferences were held, the first in August of 1943 and the second in September 1944. Russia was not represented at either conference.

At the first meeting, the Anglo-American war leaders approved recommendations of their military staffs and reached agreement on political issues stemming from military operations while the second meeting dealt with means of accelerating operations in the Pacific war, in which Russia was a neutral.

GRAIN FOR PULLETS

The results of a series of feeding tests, which were commenced at the Dominion Experimental Farm, Brandon, in 1943 show that up to 80 per cent of the total feed may be given in the form of whole grain—a mixture of wheat, oats and barley, when a suitable ration is employed and the birds are of a good laying strain. In the case of birds producing less than an average of three eggs per week, the safer plan of feeding is to compel them to consume 40 per cent or more of their feed in the form of dry mash.
