FEE, OPTIMISM AND HOPE—Mr. Albert Werenfels, representing Messrs Julius Keyser and Company, manufacturers of women's full fashioned silk hosiery, underwear and gloves blew into the Guardian Office yesterday full of pep, optimism and geniality. He had come over for the week-end by plane from Moncton and was greatly encouraged by the reports he had received both there and here of the steady upgrade in business, not only in his own line but in others as well. He met Mr. Smith, Maritime representative of General Motors at Moncton, who told him that the trouble they had was not in making sales but in getting supplies. The demand in the Maritimes was greater than the rate the supplies could be obtained from the factories. Other commercial representatives had similar optimistic tales to tell, and altogether Mr. Werenfels felt good as easy of access for the currency.

Dr. Legate On Christianity & The Church. At the evening service in St. James Church on Sunday an inspiring sermon was preached by Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, D.D., from the text Ephesians V., 25-27 "Christ loved the Church, and gave Himself for it... that He might present it to Himself a glorious church, not having spot nor wrinkle nor any such thing; but that it should be holy, and without blemish." In these verses, said the preacher, of our text we have a picture of the Church such as the Lord Jesus Christ, its King and Head, desires it to be. This is a vision of the Church as the light of God, free from every defiling and unworthy mark, the palace of God's earthly presence, the refuge of the soul from the storm and fret of life, the storehouse of comfort, strength and hope, the place of sanctuary, the centre of peace. Some day the church will reach that ideal, and when it does, it will have fulfilled its purpose, its light will flicker no more, its doors will be open day and night, and the promise of God, spoken by His prophet, will be fulfilled "The Earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea..." The beginnings of the Christian Church was that small group of men and women who were called to follow Him, whose hearts He touched with His own faith and purpose, and into whom He breathed His own Spirit. And gradually out of that group there grew a community of men and women who had banded themselves together in order to realize Christ's living presence in their midst, to associate themselves with His holy aims, and to carry out His great commission that all the world should be brought to the knowledge of the Father and the Son.
