## MONDAY

**MAN FOUND UNCONSCIOUS**—The young man B. Gaudet, who was found in an unconscious condition on King St. Thursday evening and was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital, is reported as doing well. It was thought he was the victim of an attack, at any rate his assailant has not been discovered.

**LAWRENCE TOWN, N.S., Dec. 27**—F. G. Palfrey, for twenty-seven years manager of the Royal Bank here until his superannuation six years ago, dropped dead in his home yesterday. He was sixty-five years old. Mr. Palfrey leaves a wife and daughter and three sons, George in New York, Harvey, and Ernest, of Mount Stewart, P. E. I.

Mrs. Dodd leaves to mourn four children, two sons, Robert of Montreal and Frederick of Bangor, Maine, and two daughters, Mrs. J. F. Hathaway of Boston and Mrs. Roy Clapp of this city.

Mr. Robert F. Dodd, Investment Banker of Robert Dodd & Co., Montreal, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon by plane. Mr. Dodd accompanied by his brother Mr. Frederick Dodd of Bangor, Maine, is here attending the funeral of his mother the late Mrs. John A. Dodd. They left Montreal at 7 o'clock yesterday morning, arrived in Moncton yesterday afternoon and took the plane for Charlottetown arriving here about 5 o'clock yesterday evening. Although forced to walk to the city from Upton Airport, the snowstorm having made the road impassible for cars, Mr. Dodd says there is a wonderful improvement over travel a few years ago when three or four days were required to make the trip from Montreal.

Mr. Dodd, who has been prominent in financial circles in Montreal many years, thinks the bottom of the depression has been reached. An upward trend in markets perhaps not noticed by the layman can be seen by one interested in finance.

The City of Charlottetown lost a valued citizen and his relatives and friends a loved companion when Mr. Albert Newton Large, who had been ill for the past ten days, in spite of all that loving care and medical attention could do, passed away early yesterday morning.

Mr. Large, who was sixty-two years of age, had never previously had a serious illness in his long life and his death, following a stroke, was a great shock to all. Only last spring, Mr. Large, who conducted a combined livery and gas and oil business on Queen Street, retired from the Charlottetown Fire Department after over thirty years of honorable and faithful service to his fellow citizens in this capacity. Prior to his retirement he occupied the responsible position of Assistant Fire Chief.

Mr. Large during his life always was fond of horses and was a valued member of the Victoria Driving Club.

The deceased, who was a member of the Church of England, leaves to mourn his widow, formerly Miss Mary Evans, and one son, John, in Charlottetown; also three

brothers, Fred and Charles, Charlottetown, Louis H., Calgary, Alberta, and one sister, Mrs. W. C. Stewart, Charlottetown, to all of whom The Guardian tenders sincere sympathy. The funeral will take place on Tuesday.

**CHRISTMAS AT THE CHARLOTTETOWN HOSPITAL**—The Christmas entertainment of the Social Service Department of the Charlottetown Hospital was held Wednesday afternoon in the Recreation Room of the Nurses Home. About 100 children were taken care of. Santa was present and assisted by Sister Bonaventure and Miss Murphy distributed Christmas stockings to the children. Music was provided by the nurses' Rev. A. J. MacIntyre and Rev. Bernard Gillis D. D., were present. Besides the entertainment Christmas dinners were sent to all the needy families known to the department.

A distinguished visitor to Charlottetown over the week end was Mr. R. L. Parsons, Fur Trade Commissioner for Canada of the Hudson's Bay Company, London, England. Mr. Parsons arrived Saturday night on a visit to Messrs. McLure and MacKinnon, local representatives of the Company, and leaves for the mainland by airplane at noon today. This morning he will probably inspect the fur farm of Messrs. McLure and MacKinnon at Norwood Road.

Mr. Parsons, who was born at Bay Roberts, Newfoundland, in 1884 and joined the Hudson's Bay Company as an apprentice clerk in 1900. Recognition of his ability came to him in 1905 when he was promoted to the position of post manager, and his subsequent career at the Company was steadily upward. In 1909 he was appointed district manager and came to Canada; in 1927 he became Chief Factor, and in 1930 was made Fur Trade Commissioner for Canada, having control of all the fur trading post and all the enterprises of the Hudson's Bay Company in Canada with the exception of the company's stores. The responsible position he now fills is the same which was occupied for so many years by Lord Strathcona.

Mr. Parsons is a man of pleasing personality, untiring physique, and great force of character. Since taking over the complete control of the fur trade organizations he has visited every post and travelled many thousands of miles throughout the Arctic region by airplane, boat and canoe. Many of the Hudson's Bay Company posts are near the Arctic circle, and it would be difficult to estimate the amount of travelling Mr. Parsons has done in this region, even during the present year.

As is well known, the Hudson's Bay Company are largely interested in the super fur-farm of Messrs. McLure and MacKinnon, who operate as purchasing agents of the Company in this Province.

**C. N. R. ENGINEER DEAD**—The death occurred at his home in Milton Sunday of William F. Bell, a well known C. N. R. locomotive engineer, aged 50 years. **RAILWAY LINES CLEARED**—Yesterday morning, following Sunday's snowstorm, a train with wing plow and a crew of snow shovellers was sent out to Tignish via Borden. Another train with plow and snow fighting crew left for Souris and Georgetown. The train which left S.S. side was stalled for two and a half hours east of Kensington, but finally got through. At 12 o'clock all trains were running, but from thirty minutes to an hour late. A large number of men were engaged in clearing the snow from the tracks and rails about the entrance to the railway depot and railway yards. The rotary plow could not be used as the fall of snow is not yet heavy enough.

A formal inquiry into the circumstances of the fire which destroyed Falconwood Inane Asylum on December 14th, 1931, was commenced yesterday in the Confederation Chamber, in camera, before Mr. Charles A. Beer, Provincial Fire Marshal, in the presence of Hon. J. D. Stewart, Attorney General. A verbatim report of the evidence is being furnished to the press.

A serious fire last night which broke out about 8 o'clock in the third floor of the warehouse and office building occupied by Messrs DeBols Brothers Limited, wholesale grocers and insurance agents, Queen Street, completely destroyed the firm's stock of goods valued at about \$40,000 and left the main section of the building a gutted wreck from top to bottom. At the time of writing the fire is still burning in the upper story and the roof, as well as the lower floors and partitions, has been destroyed. The building, which stands on the corner of Queen and King Streets, is a huge four-story brick edifice, occupying about half the block. A section of about one-third of the building on the King Street corner, divided from DeBols Brothers by a brick partition running all the way up, is occupied by the tobacco factory of Messrs T. B. and D. J. Riley. This section is still intact, though seriously menaced by reason of the flames having broken through the roof. The whole force and equipment of the Fire Department were called into play.
