VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Dec. 15.—The identification of a body found by coast guards on the beach near Gayhead today led to the belief that the small fishing boat Vivian, which left Newport, R. I., Dec. 7, had been lost with its crew of three.

Wallace M. Rogers of New London, Conn., identified the body as that of his brother Emory, 34, of New London. Wallace said another brother, Vladimir, 30, and Joseph Hodge, 25, also of New London, had left Newport with a fleet of fishing vessels.

Others in the fleet said they last saw the Vivian astern of the group but that she appeared in no difficulty.

Chicago Chosen For U. S. Convention

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 16.—The Republican National committee selected Chicago for its national convention at a meeting that heard and applauded an endorsement of President Hoover's administration.

The Illinois metropolis won the convention on the first ballot in a good spirited contest, with Atlantic City—the only other contestant for the meeting place. Chicago's selection was made unanimous after the roll call showed the standing 86 to 14.

The meeting took on the spirit of a Hoover rally as Chairman Fess in the opening address lauded the President's policies.

A special sub-committee decided to recommend that the convention begin June 14. This suggestion will go before the whole committee for approval tomorrow.

Balance Sheet Shows Decline

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 16.—Drastic write-offs in the company's balance sheet were approved today when shareholders of Canadian Industrial Alcohol Company gathered in annual meeting.

The report of the year's operations, showing a loss, was adopted and the following board of directors elected: Rt. Hon. Lord Shaughnessy, K.C., L. V. Wright, J. G. Lawrence, A. M. Reaper, E. Lauster, C. G. Kaestner, J. Stormont, F. J. Flanagan, J. P. Masterson, G. A. S. Harris, W. Stormont, M. Haupt, S. G. Turnbull, C. O. Bourke and A. A. Strachan.

It was explained the write-off was necessary as it was advisable to carry investments on the books at their present values rather than at the value attached to them during the past few years.

Things in the distilling business had gone from bad to worse, Lord Shaughnessy declared in his Presidential address, but he was not without hope that, in time, some measure of the company's former prosperity would return.

English Poet For Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 16.—Thomas Stearns Eliot, of London, England will become the Charles Eliot Norton, Professor of Poetry, at Harvard University for the year 1932-33. It was announced at University Hall today.

The choice of Mr. Eliot who is regarded as one of the finest poets of this generation fulfills the terms of the endowment of the Norton chair which call for the appointment of men "of high distinction within the field of literature." The present incumbent is Sigurthur Nordal, Professor of Icelandic literature at the University of Iceland, Reykjavik.

Stress Object of Conference

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 16.—Reciprocal trade agreements between the different parts of the British Empire with the prospect of stability of trade is the aim of the coming Imperial Economic Conference.

This was the intimation tonight of Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister.

The Prime Minister, who returned from London over the week-end, spoke of the evidence of a great change of economic viewpoint, as compared to a year ago, which he had observed in England.

There was a realization manifested of the great territory and resources of the Dominions. But Britain, he added, appreciated that trade agreements must be mutually advantageous to the contracting parties.

June or July next are being mentioned as probable months for the holding of the conference. In unofficial circles, there is a feeling that the result of the Australian General Elections may be a factor in determining the date. Ottawa continues to be mentioned as the probable scene of the conference.

Stand Trial On Murder Charge

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 15. (By the Canadian Press)—Charged with murdering Jack Horwitz, prominent jeweler, here Nov. 24, Ben S. Edelson, 40, was committed to trial by Magistrate Glen Strike after a preliminary hearing this afternoon.

His case will be heard at the winter sittings of the Supreme Court of Ontario, beginning Jan. 11.

Comedian Reaches Broadway At Last

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 15.—Eddie Cantor has an interest in a fish business. Gets \$1 for every word he writes; never can say "No," refuses to stay around if anyone smokes, and writes advertising slogans as a hobby.

George Jessel has read all Nietzsche's works but cannot spell the philosopher's name: Gets three neckties a day, a present from Cantor; tries to make people think he is 10 years older than he is, and refuses to stay around when anyone takes medicine.

The two comedians, who began their careers together in 1907, are now playing together on Broadway for the first time in 20 years.

"I got my start through necessity," said Jessel. "My father was a struggling playwright and—"

"Cut the sob stuff," came Cantor's challenging voice from over a line of wardrobe trunks in their joint dressing room. "If his father had been rich, he'd be right here now anyway. We've been at it since we were kids because that's our job in life and when we're old men we will, well we—"

"Long distance call for Mr. Cantor from St. Louis, someone boomed from the hall.

"Tell 'em I never answer the phone unless it's at least from Denver," Cantor replied, as he threw a new pair of shoes out the window because there were knots in the laces.

When the reminiscing began Jessel told his most embarrassing experience: He was 18 and was playing in Chicago. He took his sweetheart back stage to watch his act from the wings. They discovered his trunk outside his dressing room. It bore a sign reading:

"You're terrible. Your act is cancelled. Get out of here in a hurry. The Manager."

Jessel's favorite off-stage stunt is to grab Cantor by the shoulder when he is talking in his serious wide eyed way to someone, point to a deep scar on his forehead and say:

"Eddie used to be superstitious, but not any more. One day he bent over to pick up a lucky pin. A horse kicked him; there's the scar. And the horse is still ailing, isn't he Eddie?"

Aeroplane Picked Up At Sea Two Rescued

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 15.—An aeroplane carrying Paul Zimmermann and Ed Moodie was picked up in the open sea last night about 300 miles south of Boston by the Steamship Frieda of the Union Sulphur lines. The MacKay Radio Company reported last night both fliers were uninjured.

The plane was bound from New York to Porto Rico.

The message, picked up at the company's Rockland, Me., station, follows:

"Rescued Paul Zimmermann and Ed Moodie from airplane and took machine on board 10 miles south of Five Fathoms light vessel They were forced to land at 11 a. m. Plane bound New York to Porto Rico.

(Signed) "Gillway, master." The Mackay Company said the position was about 300 miles at sea.

The United States coast guard book locates Five Fathom light vessel as about four miles east of Five Fathoms bank, which in turn is 13 miles east of Cape May on the southern New Jersey coast.

Strike Over

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Dec. 15.—(By the Canadian Press)—Local fishing boats were bailed up tonight and await only clear weather before setting out for the fishing banks for the first time since nearly two hundred fishermen walked out on strike two weeks ago in protest against low prices and other conditions prevailing at this port.

Decision to resume fishing after a two week lay off was reached today after an agreement had been reached with the two local buyers to handle the catches of all the local boats at a general increase of one quarter cent per pound for all classes of fish.

Market For Sulphate Pulp in Germany

An extensive trade has been developed in the sale of Canadian sulphate pulp to German manufacturers of rayon or artificial silk, writes L. D. Wilgrass, Canadian Trade Commissioner at Hamburg, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal.

This trade would be very much larger if the duty on Canadian pulp were the same as on Scandinavian pulp. Owing to the absence of a trade treaty between Canada and Germany, chemical pulp of Canadian origin is subject to a duty of 71 cents per 100 kg. (220 pounds), whereas chemical pulp from other exporting countries, such as Norway, Sweden, Finland, the United States, Czechoslovakia, and Austria, pays a duty of 36 cents per 100 kg. At the present price level this difference

in duty is equivalent to about 4 per cent of the sales price. Hence the German rayon manufacturers can only afford to use Canadian pulp for their top qualities, and they buy pulp from other sources for making the cheaper qualities of artificial silk. In addition to use of Canadian sulphite pulp for rayon manufacture, bleached sulphite pulp is also being sold by British Columbia pulp mills to German paper factories. This business has only recently developed and has mostly consisted of contracts for limited quantities from the smaller German paper manufacturers. The same duty handicap applies as in the case of pulp for rayon manufacture, and if Canadian pulp could be imported at the same rate of duty as Scandinavian pulp a larger business would be possible.

500 GOING TO OTTAWA TO PROTEST CLOSING OF C. N. R. SUBDIVISION

LONDON, Ont., Dec. 16.—Loud protests were heard to-day against the closing of the Alvinston subdivision of the Canadian National Railway and according to rumors efforts are being made to have a party of 500 go by special train from that town to Ottawa in protest, next Wednesday.

According to statements made today arrangements are being made to have Howard Fraleigh, member for East Lambton the reeve of Brook township, Lambton county and Reeve J. A. Leitch, reeve of Mosa township, Middlesex county accompanying the protesting delegations.

It was announced several days ago that the 33 mile Alvinston subdivision would be entirely closed on

January 1 if the board of railway commissioners would permit the C. N. R. to do so.

The subdivision runs from Glenora to Kingsport joining the main lines from London to Windsor and London to Sarnia.
