NOTES ON THE FIFTH P. E. I. EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE 47TH WEEK ENDING SEPTEMBER 25th, 1923

There was a decrease of 53 eggs in the Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest for the 47th week ending September 25th, 1923. The total production for the week being 657 compared with 710 of the previous week. The total production of the Contest to date is 29802. A large number of the birds are moulting. Col. Geo. E. Crockett's pen of Barred Rocks leads the Contest for the week with 50 eggs. Mr. L. B. Toombs, Barred Rocks tied for second with Mr. Augustine Wisner's White Wyandottes with 47 eggs each. Mr. D. F. McDonald's pen of Barred Rocks third with 42 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns fourth with 41 eggs. Mr. Wendell Graham's pen of Anconas tied with Mr. H. L. Machon's pen of Barred Rocks for sixth with 38 eggs each and Pendleton Bros. pen of Barred Rocks seventh with 37 eggs.

Mrs. Edward Bullpitt's pen of White Leghorns continues to lead the contest to date with 1824 eggs. Mr. D. F. McDonald's Barred Rocks second with 1820 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 18 third with 1790 eggs. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's pen of White Leghorns fourth with 1767 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns, No. 15, fifth with 1765 eggs. Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns sixth with 1657 eggs. Mr. Augustine Wisner's pen of White Wyandottes seventh with 1639 eggs and Pendleton Bros., Barred Rocks eighth with 1638 eggs. Seventeen hens have laid over 200 eggs to date.
