THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

We reproduce in another column of this issue an editorial article from the St. John Sun dealing with our telegraph service. The editor of The Sun recently visited the Island and had an opportunity of observing the working of the telegraph monopoly at close range. As an intelligent, progressive and just man he was necessarily somewhat amazed and shocked by the conditions existing. His impressions of our position and the facts furnished showing what the Government is doing to give telegraph facilities to other parts of the Dominion, will well repay the reading. The article sets out in relief the callous and cruel neglect of the Government and the sordid and godless character of the monopoly under which we suffer. We trust that the day of relief may be near and that the efforts of our representatives to move the Government may prove successful. If such is not the case it only remains for the people without distinction of political lines to form themselves into a party of punishment.

In the Anglo-American Company we know with whom we have to deal. Its principles as interpreted by its management to the people of Prince Edward Island have not been those of the Golden Rule, but rather of that rule reversed—“Do unto others as ye would not that they shall do unto you.” The least service possible, exacting the largest price that necessity can be compelled to pay. The principle upon which it is operated would if extended, close our ports to ships, our railways, our streets and roads to traffic, and shut out our mail service and our water service from use during twelve hours out of the twenty-four. It would “mete and vend the light and air.” Sordid and selfish, greedy of gain, unaccommodating, shameless, is the underlying principle of all monopolies. It is difficult to see how this one can be mended. It ought to be ended. We confess to a feeling of revulsion against the Government making terms, buying partial concessions, dickering over how much blackmail it shall pay for a few more hours of service or a partial lowering of rates. Anything short of as good a service at equal rates with the other Provinces would be a weak capitulation. The real issue cannot be settled by a compromise.

THE DISPOSAL OF DEAD ANIMALS

It seems probable that this matter will come before the City Council at its meeting tonight. His Worship the Mayor after casting about for a solution of the troublesome question has obtained an offer from the Packing Company which seems worthy of consideration. The company has, as all large concerns of the kind have, all the appliances for converting into a valuable fertilizer the offal of the animals slaughtered on the premises. It appears that the management are willing to dispose in like manner of all the dead animals from the city delivered to them, for \$200 a year. This would provide a place for disposing of this class of refuse in an inoffensive way, and so remedy the present conditions in which dead carcasses are thrown over the river banks into the water, or perhaps partially buried in the sands of the shore, or in winter left upon the ice. In most cases the owner of the animals would be able to pay, so that the city would be recouped for the greater part of the outlay. The matter is one that presses for solution and we know of no practical method better than that which His Worship has proposed.

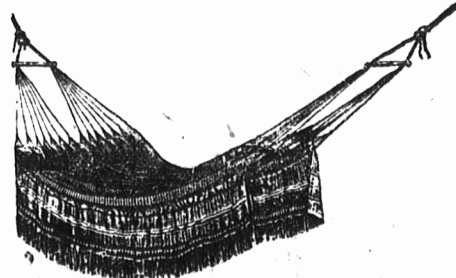
