CHEAP DIVORCES IN LONDON BY NEW LICENSING ACT.

Husbands and Wives Fill Courts Seeking Release From Habitual Drunkards.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The new Licensing Act, which came into force on New Year's Day, has been giving the magistrates and police much new work.

The police courts on Thursday morning were crowded with people curious to see how the new act worked.

They certainly learned things about the law of drinking which surprised them.

One of the first victims, to give an instance, was an old woman of Southwark, who came before the magistrate for the sixth time since the beginning of 1903, charged with being drunk. She was sent to prison for a month, bound over to keep the peace and "blacklisted" as an habitual drunkard, which means that she is liable to a heavier penalty if she is even discovered, purchasing intoxicating liquor in the next three years.

The most notable case dealt with was the summons brought by and granted to Sir Charles Allen Lawson, the Anglo-Indian publicist, against his wife as an habitual drunkard. The new law gives the magistrate the power to grant to either husband or wife a separation from the offending party on evidence of repeated convictions for drunkenness.

But the court had the humors, too. One man, for instance, challenged the magistrate's right to "blacklist" him on the ground that he got drunk on New Year's Eve before the act came into force. The new drink act, besides, is almost as good as a cheap divorce.

In some cases its effect has been already quite startling. There were numerous applications on New Year's Day and again yesterday for a judicial separation on the part of husbands and wives, charging their spouses with habitual drinking so that they were unable to live together. Such was the case of a couple, in which the complainant under the section was asked by the Clerkenwell Magistrate whether he considered that by reason of habitual drinking his wife was dangerous to herself and others and incapable of managing

herself and her affairs.

"Yes," was the answer, and the summons was granted, which means that if sufficient evidence is forthcoming on the charge the woman may be taken care of at the State expense for an indefinite period.

There is another case. A woman in North London obtained a summons against her husband, because, as she described him, he was an "intolerable companion." They kept a beer house, and the husband had an unpleasant way of clearing the money drawer when he took the notion, which the judge considered was quite sufficient cause for granting the summons.

Mr. Rose, the senior Magistrate at the West London Court, interviewed on this legislative novelty, said the new thing about it which would prove a terror to evildoers was the "blacklist," to qualify for which a person had to be convicted for drunkenness three times during the year.

He had no doubt the roll of dishonor would soon reach large proportions, but, while it would be extremely easy to prepare the blacklist, the difficulty would be given when the publicans were supplied with it for the purpose of denying drink to those whose names and descriptions were written thereon.

Unless a man happens to have a wooden leg or other prominent feature, how is the barman, it was asked, to identify him supposing he had never had that customer at his bar before.

Mr. Rose agreed that busy publicans cannot always be producing the black list but for the identification of unknown persons with red noses policemen will have to judge whether the person is drunk or sober and answer to the qualifications of the black list.

Mr. Rose puts much faith in the good sense of policemen. Nevertheless clubmen who may be feeling out of sorts after dinner had better use hansom, as the act appears to have missed those convenient vehicles in its scope.
