Cowley Clips Six Points Off Drillon's Lead

MONTREAL, Jan. 24.—(AP)—A new threat to Gordie Drillon's scoring leadership of the National Hockey League and his former Maritimers arose last week when Bill Cowley of Boston shaved six points off the Montreal boy's first place margin.

While Drillon and his Toronto mates went pointless, Cowley, a former Halifax Wolverine, picked up three goals and an equal number of assists to boost his total to 24. He still was eight points behind the Maple Leaf flash but his rapid firing showed Drillon was not altogether out of reach.

Hard luck man of the Maritimers, Ray Gelfin of Boston gained three assists for a 17-point total before a jaw injury put him on the sidelines. The points left, Gelfin, once a Charlottetown and Saint John amateur, tied for third place with Americans, Eddie Wiseman, native of Newcastle, N. B.

Bill (Flash) Hollett, third Maritimer on Boston's lineup, scored a goal in his team's rout of Toronto Saturday and moved into a tie at five points with Canadiens' Joffe Deslites, another former Charlottetown and Saint John player.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—A return 12-round bout between James J. Braddock, formerly heavyweight champion and the Welshman, Tommy Farr, in Madison Square today.

Promoter Mike Jacobs said he hopes to have the bout settled by Friday's fight—instead of the 20 per cent Jacobs offered but Tommy, who feels he is the victim of a poor decision last week is so anxious for a return crack at Jimmy, is not likely to let this difference stand in the way of the meeting.

He made this attitude plain when he turned down Jacobs' offer to fight Mac Barr here March 11. "I'm not going to take a chance of getting hurt before I meet him again."

Before going into conference with Jacobs, Farr and Braddock posed for photographers and Tommy apologized to Braddock for not slinking hands with him in the ring after Friday's fight.

Later Farr explained the affair to newspapermen as follows: "I can't see why people should expect me to kiss Braddock after getting what I thought was a raw deal, but I humbly apologize to Braddock if I hurt his feelings. I didn't see him when he came across the ring and the films will bear me out. I didn't know what the booby was about when I left the ring. If I had known Braddock was up there to shake hands I'd have run back up those steps to meet him."

Cec. Dillon Is N.H.L. Leading Goal-getter

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Jan. 24.—The statistical news of the week in the National Hockey League has been that Cecil Dillon's goal-scoring prowess is still leading the circuit.

Not even Gordie Drillon of Toronto has challenged now the New York Ranger's supremacy in the scoring department. The Maple Leaf's winger still leads the league at 31 goals and 12 assists, but it's Dillon who's out ahead on the actual tallies.

He has 17. That puts Tim three up on Drillon, George Mantha and Toe Blake of Montreal Canadiens. Dillon fattened his average by three goals during the week, boosting himself to 17 goals and 12 assists.

But young Drillon is the league's leading helper on goals, with 18 assists. Those and his 14 goals give him a margin of three points on Dillon in the total count.

Tied for second place in the assists, three points behind the Toronto player, are Spi Aggs of the Leafs, Red Lorrain of Canadiens and Marty Barry of Detroit Red Wings.

In the penalty division, Allan Shields of Montreal Maroons is still unchallenged. He has 57 minutes on the bench.
