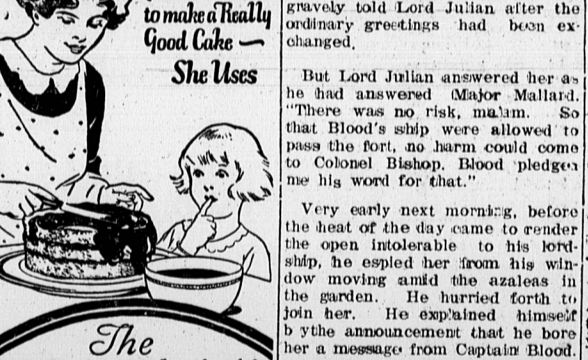
CHAPTER XX.—Continued
