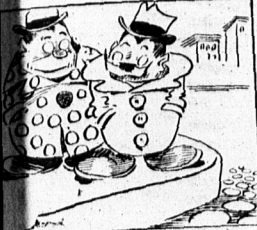

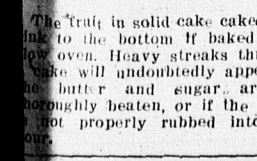

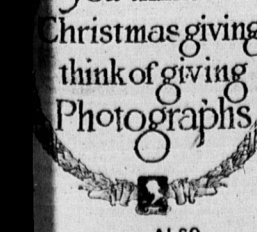

First Canadian Bond Issue Falls Due

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—Bonds of the first of Canada's domestic war loan issues, fell due December 1 and are being redeemed on presentation at chartered banks and branch offices of the Receiver General throughout Canada. Already, according to the Finance Department a large proportion of the issue has been cashed.

The original offering of 1915 was of \$50,000,000. This was increased through over subscription to \$100,000,000. The total figure has been reduced by conversion of \$42,045,000, which is the amount now being redeemed.
