By all means let the snow cuttings on the railway be speedily made a foot or more wider. It will save serious trouble when other storms come as they surely will.

The Provincial Government, while naturally reluctant to interfere in a matter pertaining to federal official duty, is to be commended for taking action to learn whether something cannot be done to set the winter steamers in motion.

A man of experience in the use of explosives in ice informs The Guardian that the best results are obtained by placing the charges in slant-wise as in that case both an upward and downward force is exercised. This is worth trying.

It appears that when Capt. Finlayson of the Minto got clear of his passengers by their transfer across the ice to the Stanley, he also got rid of his main incentive to action. The passengers, as one of them informs The Guardian, were almost in insurrection over the inaction of the captain. Since their departure he has had a quiet time in port.

Would not the employment of more men have opened the railway in less time without additional cost? If so the point is important. We think, too, that men are as much entitled to pay for extra hours in clearing the track as when otherwise employed over time. There is also a general impression that the snow cuttings ought at once to be widened. Until this is done an hour's drift at any time may stop all traffic.

We are gratified to learn that Minister Profontaine in a letter to Premier Peters explains his answer to Mr. Martin to mean only that no decision had yet been reached on the Fishery Award matter and that it will go to the Supreme Court for adjudication.

She ought to be provisioned for a month, in view of the chances of being caught and detained. Surely this is a revelation of utter incompetency somewhere.

Twice as many men in half the time would clear the railway when it is blocked for the simple reason that snow is easier moved when it has first fallen or drifted in than it is later when hardened. Another suggestion that seems of some value is that when snow is falling or drifting the engines and plows should be kept in motion day and night to prevent such an accumulation as will entirely block the road.

Whether it is easier to break through an ice-barrier into a harbor, or to break out from the inside we do not know. Capt. Finlayson does not think it useful to aid the Minto by men or otherwise to get out, but that such agencies "can render great aid toward bringing the Stanley in." Thus throwing all the work upon the Stanley while the Minto lies idle! Common sense would say that both boats should be aided to the utmost to break out as well as to break in.
