

JAPANESE ARE VICTORIOUS ALL ALONG THE BATTLE LINE

Russians Lose a Score of Guns, Japs a Thousand Men—Defeat and Retreat Cut Off—Transports Sunk—Victory of Fu Chow—Russian General Shot.

RUSSIANS LOSE FOURTEEN GUNS.

LONDON, June 16.—(Special)—In a fight at Telissu, eighty miles north of Port Arthur the Russians lost five hundred men killed and wounded three hundred prisoners and fourteen guns.

THE JAPS' COSTLY VICTORY.

The Japanese losses are estimated at a thousand killed and wounded.

ANOTHER RUSSIAN DEFEAT.

It is reported that General Sakelberg sustained disastrous defeat at Vafanjon and that his retreat is cut off.

JAP TRANSPORTS SUNK.

The Japanese transports Hitachi and Sado were sunk by the Russian Valdivostock squadron off Okai Island near the coast of Japan.

397 survivors first reached Maji and 153 survivors from the Sado have arrived at Kokura. The full extent of

the casualties is not known.

JAPS CAPTURE TELISSU.

It is said the Japanese have captured Telissu the Russians losing six guns.

RUSSIAN FORCES DIVIDED.

The Russian forces in the vicinity of Kai Chow are divided and the Japanese are said to be between them.

ANOTHER JAP VICTORY.

Unofficial reports are received of a great Japanese victory at Fu Chow north of Port Arthur.

The Russians are said to have lost a thousand men and retreated in disorder leaving all guns on the field.

RUSSIAN GENERAL SHOT.

St. PETERSBURG, June 16.—(Special)—General Bobrikoff, General of Finland, was shot and mortally wounded at the entrance to the Finnish Senate at Helsingfors.

ISLANDER KILLED BY EXPRESS TRAIN

Frank Jenkins of Little River, P. E. Island

Met Death in a Frightful Manner—His Skull Crushed by the Engine—The Body Sent Home.

On Saturday afternoon last, Edward Jenkins, cousin of R. Frank Burhoe of this town was instantly killed by being hit by an express train on the B. & A. road, just over the Westboro line, in North Grafton.

It appears that Jenkins was crossing the track, and stepped aside to avoid being hit by an east bound freight train, and not noticing the express train coming in the opposite direction stepped immediately in front of it, and the train being so near it could not be stopped before it hit him, fearfully crushing his skull. The train was coming around a sharp curve at the time.

The train was stopped and the body taken out and carried to Worcester and placed in the undertaking rooms of Sessions & Sons, by order of medical examiner Baker

Mr and Mrs Burhoe were on the way to Marlboro when they heard the sad news, and immediately returned, and Mr Burhoe went to Worcester at once to learn the particulars and care for the body.

Mr. Jenkins was a young man 27 years of age, and was working on the farm in front of the old Ashley Rice house, known as Colony No 1 in North Grafton, and had left there to go to the Colvin place in the Shrewsbury district known as Colony No. 2 to do chores for the night.

In going from one colony to another through the fields it is necessary to cross the railway track.

The attendants who were in the field at the time say the engine on the express blew his whistle three times, but Jenkins either did not hear the warning whistle, owing to the noise made by the freight, or he did not have time to get across the track before the train struck him.

Jenkins was formerly employed at the Westboro hospital. He was a native of Little River, Prince Edward Island, where his parents now reside. He had worked at the colony two months or more, and was well liked by the officials and the attendants generally. He was of a genial nature and easily made friends.

A despatch was sent to his brother, Henry Jenkins, at Gonia, N. H., late Saturday afternoon but it was not received till Monday morning. His brother came immediately and the remains were taken to his home in Little River on Wednesday morning.

His sad death has cast a gloom among a large circle of relatives, acquaintances, and friends. Westboro Mass. ex.

THE DAGGER AND THE CROSS.

The story of "The Dagger and the Cross" begins in the year 1894 in Venice. Francesca, the wife of Roubillac, a painter, is beloved by Zillette, a sculptor. Through the power of hypnotic influences the woman returns the love of the latter. Roubillac and his wife are persuaded by Lorenzo, a priest, to leave Venice for England, where the former is engaged to decorate the chapel on the estate of Sir George Talbot. The real action of the play begins in the castle of Talbot on Christmas Eve. Roubillac and Francesca are again happy and contented. Then Zillette's voice is heard among the carol singers without, and shortly afterwards he enters. The old relations are renewed, though Zillette to add an intrigue with Mary, the daughter of Sir George and the sweetheart of a splendid young Englishman Clegg. Zillette knowing that Roubillac wants him to give up Francesca, offers to do so on condition that Roubillac impersonate a priest and marry him to Mary. In his desperation Roubillac agrees and a secret marriage takes place. After the ceremony, however, Zillette breaks his word to Roubillac, and the latter lies in wait in the forest, to kill his persecutor. When Zillette and Mary meet near Roubillac's hiding place they encounter Clegg. The men quarrel. The Englishman hurls the Venetian against the very tree which conceals Roubillac and the latter takes this opportunity to thrust the dagger into the villain's heart. It is night and Clegg does not witness the act. A moment later Clegg is discovered standing over the body with dagger in hand by Sir George Talbot and is accused of murder.

In the meantime Roubillac has fled away. He finds his wife dying in a little cottage by the sea. Francesca makes him confess the murder to a priest which he does in a strong scene after his wife's death. As a penance, he is directed to return to England holding the dagger reversed in his hand as a sign of the cross and there confess his crime. It is the year of the great plague, and as Roubillac makes his confession he dies of the dread disease. His death and atonement lift the blight of the plague and Clegg and Mary are reunited.

With Mr. Mantell in the role of Roubillac, Miss Russell as Francesca, Otto Audrie as the villain Zillette, Walter Campbell as Father Lorenzo, the above emotional drama was presented last evening in a manner that marks a new era in the history of the theatre in Charlottetown. There was no weak spot in the performance. It was alike strong in character portrayal, in the exhibition of varied emotion and in scenic effect. Repeated curtain calls honored the chief performers. Tonight in the farewell performance of a season all too brief The Face in the Moonlight will be the attraction.
