SAINT JOHN, N.B., Sept. 25.—There are headaches and headaches. Nine months ago a closing garage door struck Mr. O. Raymond McAllister on the head. 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Ball Stolen During Fight

MONTREAL, Sept. 24.—Fisticuffs and petty larceny added spice to the exhibition football game between Montreal Football Club's inter-provincial football union team and Montreal's Canadian National inter-mediate here yesterday. The big four entry won in a canter, 31-0 as Montreal got its first taste of football for the season. Fists flew in the fourth quarter and the crowd surged into the field to form a struggling mass of humanity sprinkled with policeman and officials trying their best to bring a semblance of order out of the melee. While the fight was swaying back and forth somebody ran off with the football and referee Ken Barwick had to get a new pigskin before the game could be resumed. Clarry Foran, astute Wheelers' coach, picked a tough crew for his squad's first test under fire. The rough and ready railroad shopmen gave no quarter and asked none. They tore into the seniors with a will and held them fairly well one quarter. Then the Wheelers cut loose and the score began to mount. Seven penalties were meted out in the course of the battle, four of them resulting from the spectacular Donnbyrick in the closing moments of the game.

BELIEVES SON ALIVE IN ENGLAND

PICTOU, N.S., Sept. 25.—(C.P.)—A Nova Scotian mother who has steadfastly refused to believe her step-son died in Flanders hoped tonight for confirmation of his identity behind the mysterious name of a patient in Westminster Military Hospital at London, Ont. "X. K. Smith," they named this soldier when he was taken to hospital at the end of the war, his memory shattered by overseas experiences. But he could remember his last name as Jordan, and that is why Mrs. George Jordan of Pictou is hoping for a re-union. Wilson Jordan went overseas at the outbreak of hostilities, but he was too young for actual fighting, so he was kept in England until his 18th birthday. Then they sent him to France, and one day Mrs. Jordan got an official letter telling her he was "missing." But she refused to believe him dead, and through the years she has waited for his return. When she read this summer of the "X. K. Smith" who had given his name as Jordan when he arrived in England, she wrote to Westminster Hospital authorities for further information. Now she is waiting for word from the hospital. And she has enlisted the aid also of Dr. Frederick Yorston, Montreal Editor and a native of Pictou County, who wrote her that he would investigate the matter further. Mrs. Jordan and others of the family are hoping that soon they will be seeing Wilson again. His father is here, and there are several brothers and sisters who had long ago given up Wilson as dead.

Kaiser Suspected Poisoning Scheme

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The German Kaiser's alleged fear that the late Queen Alexandra intended to poison him is one of the many stories related by the Countess of Oxford and Asquith, in a further book of reminiscences published today. Following the visit of King Edward and Queen Alexandra to Berlin in 1909, Mrs. Asquith, as the authoress was then, asked the Queen what she had discussed with the Kaiser during meals. "The Kaiser ate so little," the Queen replied, "that one day I said to him: 'You work and worry — why don't you eat? Eating is good for the brain.'" "Looking affronted the Kaiser said: 'You find me stupid.' Then the Queen described how she made a little twist with her fingers in front of the Kaiser's face saying, 'well, what about all this kiddoole over your navy?'" "The Kaiser, the Queen added, appeared to take this in good part. But the poisoning fear comes in here, where, according to the reminiscences, Queen Alexandra maintained she gave the Kaiser a box of meat lozenges to stimulate his appetite. They were inspected by the Kaiser and a doctor. "Stupid man," exclaimed the Queen to Mrs. Asquith. "He thought I wanted to poison him."

The writer recalls another conversation with Queen Alexandra concerning King Edward's terrier, Caesar, which followed his hearse at the King's funeral. "Poor little dog," said Mrs. Asquith to the Queen. "His devotion to the King, Madam, touched every spectator." "Horrid little dog," replied the Queen. "He never went near my poor husband when he was ill." "But madam," urged Mrs. Asquith, "the day you took my husband to see the King when he was dead, the dog was lying at his feet." "For warmth, my dear," the Queen retorted. "But did he ever show any sign of affection," asked Mrs. Asquith. "He put his paws on the side of the coffin before the top was screwed down," said the Queen.

Gov. General's Plea For Social Service

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—An appeal to private philanthropy to sustain the efficiency of Canadian social services in the critical two months to come, was issued tonight by the Earl of Bessborough, Governor-General of Canada. "When war, shipwreck, fire, earthquake — when such overwhelming disasters of nature threaten man, then their very evidence calls forth courage and daring," His Excellency declared, "but the insidious growing fear of economic insecurity has a fatal tendency to undermine those very qualities, so necessary to the strength of a Great Nation. Men become, as the Prince of Wales himself has said, 'sick at heart from prolonged idleness'; and the only remedy, he has reminded us, is that each and all of us should 'get together whenever the burden lies heaviest, face up to the most urgent local need, and see if the community on the spot cannot make its own self-directed contribution to a problem so vast, and so urgent, that, on its solution, the very future of Canada may be said to depend.'"

Lord Bessborough's appeal is the first of a series by leaders of church and state in Canada for the next six weeks, a period during which the Federated Social Services and Community Chests from Halifax to Vancouver will launch their annual appeal for welfare services maintained by private philanthropy.

Falconwood Hospital

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—(C.P.)—Decision of the Dominion Department of Fisheries to send a doctor to treat cases of sickness or accident, has been a great boon to Canadian fishermen, whose vessels go to the great banks off Newfoundland each year. The fleet is away from port for weeks at a time, and while the vessels remain on the banks the doctors, on the fisheries protection vessel, "stands by."

Statistics show that this sea-going doctor treated 260 patients last year, and in 115 cases surgical treatment was required. In the preceding year the doctor's cases numbered 362.
