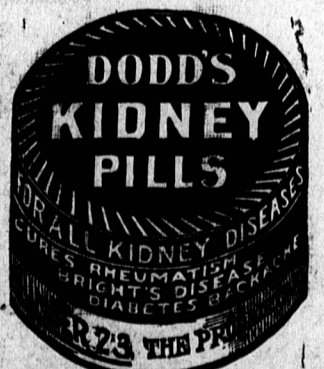

SPORTING NEWS

INTERESTING RACES ON ICE YESTERDAY

The first of a series of ice races in Charlottetown was held yesterday afternoon on the speedway, situated between the head of the railway wharf and Hillsboro bridge. The ice was splendid, affording a nice course for the horses, and this, together with the fact that the wind was blowing down the course, made the time extremely fast. It is safe to say that the heats trotted and paced yesterday were better than any previously accomplished in this province, owing to the conditions mentioned before. There was a large crowd of spectators present, both on foot and in teams. Everyone seemed greatly interested in the finishes and the excellent view which they obtained rendered the sport very enjoyable. It is but fitting to mention here that these races were made possible by the generosity of the Provincial Exhibition Association and Mr. Frank R. Heartz, of this city, these parties having contributed very appreciable purses in each event.

The races were 2.30 pace and 3-minute trot. The 2.30 pace was won by Derby, 2.34, owned and driven by J. A. Henderson, of Charlottetown. Derby came here with the reputation of being one of the fastest ice horses in Nova Scotia, and last year was simply invincible. His record is 1.24 for the half-mile on ice. He was an easy winner yesterday, apparently not extending himself to his limit. Driver Henderson used good judgment in reining him and seemed to rate his speed perfectly throughout the course. The fight for second position was between Rexlight, owned by I. Robinson, North River, and driven by that capable reinsman, Fred Cameron, and Mott Miller, owned by A. Godkin and driven by the popular Kelly. These two horses put up an excellent struggle for the second place, being very close. Zealot also showed some very good bursts of speed; this horse is owned by M. McKenna, of Vernon River, and is a good pacer. The three-minute trot provided a good deal of interest, since it was the first trotting event of Mayor Todd, the handsome and popular stallion owned by Hammond Kelly, Southport. Mayor Todd, Alfred K., Ruth H., and Oakley H. were the starters. They are a quartette of exceptionally fast trotters. Ruth H. seemed to have wonderful speed, but she was not very steady and so did not figure in the winning end. In the first heat Alfred K. led until about fifty yards from the wire, when Mayor Todd came through very fast and beat him by a neck, Oakley H. finishing at Alfred K.'s nose. In this heat Ruth H. won for two-thirds of the distance, when she made a break and lost her chance. The next heat was a great battle between Alfred K. and Mayor Todd, the latter winning by half-lengths. This heat was trotted in 1.7. In the third heat Todd finished slightly ahead of Alfred K., but was set back for a bad break. In the fourth heat Todd trotted beautifully from wire to wire, never lifting his nose, and winning amid great applause.

The officials acted in every respect satisfactorily, discharging their duties in a fearless and impartial manner, their decisions being questioned unhesitatingly and without objection. They were: Starter—O. McDonald; Judges: F. Hughes, J. Crabbie, J. L. Wood; Patrol Judges: D. McKinnon, George Mahar, E. Ready; Timers: O. Fraisor and J. Crabbie.

To-day the 2.19 pace and 2.22 trot will be pulled off. They promise to be extremely interesting events, and will bring together the fastest horses in the province. Derby will be pitted against some very high-class pacers and the public will have an opportunity of seeing him extended to his limit. The trotting race will also furnish a considerable amount of excitement, as some splendid trotters, including the best of to-day's entries, will race against one another. Everyone who can possibly do so should be present. The purses are \$100, guaranteed in each event. They are given by the Canada Fox Exchange and Investment Co., Ltd.
